**Editorial Snap Shots.**

Boost! Be a live booster, for there is something worth boosting in Tillamook.

No more plank side walks are to be built in Portland. We wish we could say the same for Tillamook City.

My! Haven't those water hogs got a big gall. The way to choke them off is to quit levying taxes to maintain the water system.

It does not matter how much money is spent on roads in this county, there will always be a bevy of knockers. So what is the use of taking any notice of them, for they keep knocking and belly aching, anyway?

The editor comes in for as much roasting as anyone, no doubt, because he has a mind and a will of his own, but when it comes to writing articles advertising the county, the editor isn't such a bad fellow after, that is the real estate men don't think so.

A few years ago the county employed a road master at \$100 a month, and the Headlight raised an objection, for the reason that we did not see that any material advantage could be gained by having an increase in bosses to boss road work, or, in other words, there was no necessity of having a road master to boss road supervisors who knew as much, and in some cases more, about road building than the roadmaster. Had the road master been an experienced engineer who could have surveyed and planned out roads and bridges and prepared specifications and estimates of costs, and could have undertaken the construction of them, then we

would not have protested.

After years of agitation for a bridge across Tillamook river, it is gratifying to know that the toll exacted from people crossing that river will soon be a thing of the past. It is a progressive move on the part of the county court in having a bridge built there, for it will help to open up and develop the country, yet for all that we understand that there are some who are knocking. With a bridge across the Tillamook river and the road to Netarts re-constructed, which will necessarily follow, this is an improvement which will greatly benefit this city and the Netarts country. The spirit of the times is to open up the country with good high ways and water ways, and in this respect the county court is doing some good work and is deserving of a great deal of credit.

The Headlight published two weeks ago a small list of the amounts of the checks paid to dairymen for milk in the month of May, and as a result hundreds of copies of the paper have been sent to the East, and now the real estate men are circulating the same information. We were surprised, however, to hear that a recent arrival in the county, when shown the newspaper article, would not believe the figures and that it was an advertising scheme fixed up by the editor. That reminds us of some of the little incidents which took place when the editor told some facts about Reid building the railroad being "hot air," and the article caused such a sensation that some people thought the editor ought to be run out of town, and one important, wealthy personage had the gall to tell the editor that he did not know how to run a news-

paper because he told too much truth in it. The editor did not propose that the "hot air" railroad should cause a "hot air" boom.

We think Major McIndoe impressed his hearers on Friday evening with one fact, and it was this: The rivers and harbors committee is willing to help any section of country with harbor improvements whenever the people show a disposition to help themselves. That is a fair way of looking at it, for there is a tendency to rely too much upon the national government for harbor improvements. So this is no time to stand back and whittle wood, with the expectancy that the government is going to do it all. The question of the improvement of the water front of this city and the straightening, widening and deepening of Hoquarton slough will never be undertaken by the government until the people show a disposition to help themselves. We think, too, that any port that is willing to get in and help itself should have government aid before a port that shows no disposition to help itself. And as that is a fair way for the rivers and harbors committee to act in making appropriations, it behooves the people of this city and vicinity if they want government aid in harbor improvements they must show a willingness to help themselves.

The county court did the right thing on Saturday when it took the matter of the appointment of an engineer under advisement, for the reason that the court should be thoroughly advised before it comes to a decision, and we have not the least doubt but what it will carefully weigh the matter from all points of view. That is proper. There is one

thing which the court will have to consider, and that is the cost, and where and in what way—the salary of an engineer and what would be the costs of running his office or in running surveys? These are a few things we have not discussed up to the present time, for we feel confident that even those who advocate the change should be more fully informed. No one wants to force another official upon the county unless it can be shown conclusively that it is a matter of public economy to do so, and where better and more permanent results can be obtained. The court has plenty of time to deliberate, and by way of experiment it has been suggested that the court employ an engineer to survey, plan out and give an estimate of cost to lay out a new road from the new bridge which is to be built across the Tillamook river to Netarts. Although the Headlight is strongly in favor of an engineer, we feel confident that the court will do the right thing, but give them plenty of time to deliberate, for nothing can be gained by forcing the matter to an issue right away.

**Banquet to Major McIndoe.**

The business men on Friday evening tendered Major J. E. McIndoe, the engineer in charge of the government work, a banquet at the Palace Restaurant, Jenkins' orchestra furnishing the music. James Walton acted as toastmaster, and he contended in favor of a 9 foot channel from Tillamook City to Tillamook bay. Mayor Thomas Coates also spoke in favor of a 9 foot channel. H. T. Botts gave the status of the Port of Tillamook and what was being done to hold another election. He said the people wanted Hoquarton slough improved, who were willing to help do so, but considering the large amount of present and prospective commerce from this city and county he thought the government should assist in the improvement of the slough as well as undertake the improvement of Tillamook bay. Major McIndoe said he had been called upon to report again upon the project for the improvement of Tillamook bay which had been turned down by the Board of Engineers at Washington, but he found that the commerce of the port had not increased to such an extent to justify the rivers and harbors committee in starting the project, especially as the cost of building a jetty would be considerable more now than it was some years ago when the estimate was made, and for those reasons he did not entertain much hope of obtaining an appropriation for the improvement of

**ANOTHER CASE OF VIOLENCE.**

**Victor Ettwein Shoots self with Rifle.**

Word reached this city yesterday morning that the body of Victor Ettwein, a German, who had homestead near Hemlock had been shot with a bullet hole in his head by his side, and at first it was thought whether the man had been committed suicide. Sheriff and Coroner Hawk hurried to make an investigation which proved to be a case of suicide.

He was last seen alive on C. J. Blanchard, who knew about him on account of the having dynamite, and leaving met with an accident, Blanchard to see if anything had happened. While doing so he came across the body of Ettwein on the way between Al Beatty's house, with a gun by his side, laying flat on his back with a bullet hole in the head, the muzzle of the gun in the ground and the stock in a hole where he lay.

The evidence at the inquest that the man had committed suicide and a verdict to that effect was returned. Ettwein had made two suicide attempts with a rifle, shot taking effect in his head, to doing so he had cleaned and burned his old clothes and a letter in German bidding his wife to be home in this county a year ago and worked at the Lumber Company's saw mill in Hemlock. He was about 35 years of age and had a banking account of \$85.30 in the Tillamook

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
