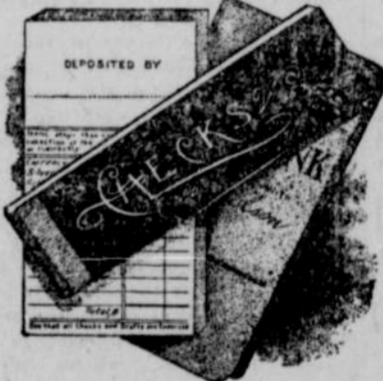

The handle of the hammer, which was attached to his side, was broken into splinters. Dr. Boals attended to the injuries.
