We understand that it is the intention of the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co. to apply at the next meeting of the city council for a franchise to run a spur from the depot to the water front, with permission to use the street. This is a matter which the railroad committee took up with the railroad company some time ago, and as it will be a great benefit to the city, and especially to manufacturing concerns and an inducement to new industries to locate in the city, where they can have railroad and water transportation, the city council will, no doubt, readily grant the franchise to the railroad company, for should it be found necessary to extend the railroad to Bay-ocean Park or Netarts, this would be the best way to get through the city, thus it will answer two purposes, the summer travel to the beaches and the commercial interests of the city.

Hoskins who had shot the dog, a complaint was sworn out against him and he waived examination and was bound over to the grand jury. It appears that the dog chased a deer and a fawn amongst Mr. Hoskins' cows, which worried the animals, and one of the cows getting injured by being chased by the dog, he put a stop to it by shooting it.

The rain on Saturday night and on Sunday was not appreciated by those who were haymaking, and, unfortunately, quite a large quantity of grass was down. The rain thoroughly soaked the county and, no doubt, made the timber owners feel happy. The rain continued, off and on, until Wednesday morning, when it suddenly turned fine and Old Sol obscured for four days, much to the delight of everybody in the county. Although the rain delayed the hay harvest for several days, it will do a wonderful amount of good, making the grass grow and providing plenty of green feed for the dairy herds.

Dr. Emil Enna gave a piano recital at the opera house Wednesday, under the auspices of the Tillamook Concert Band, and although it was probably the first of its kind in 'his neck of the woods, he charmed and delighted lovers of classic music, every piece played being well applauded. He has certainly mastered the piano, and combined with his splendid musical ability, he never fails to interest an audience. His technique would be hard to beat, and the ease and brilliancy in which he rendered some of the master pieces of music places Dr. Enna in the class of the leading musicians of the present day. So charmed were the audience on Wednesday evening, and notwithstanding that he responded to several encores, the audience felt reluctant to leave when the program was finished, which forced Dr. Enna on the stage to play another piece.

ARSTILL IN TROUBLE AGAIN.

Held Up Proprietor of Grocery Store at Liberty and Is Captured.

SALEM, Or., July 27.--Sheriff Harry Minto and Deputy William Esch returned this evening from Independence with L. J. Arstall, who was captured after an exciting chase. Arstall is charged with attempting to hold up J. J. McDonald, proprietor of the Liberty grocery store, last night.

This morning Rural Mail Carrier William Squire came in and reported that he had seen a man near Hall's Ferry who answered the description of the suspect in the McDonald holdup case. The Sheriff and his deputy started immediately, and soon got track of the fellow, whom they trailed clear into Independence by the linen duster worn by the man who held up McDonald, and which the stranger carried under his arm.

As the Sheriff and deputy drove into Independence the man with the linen duster was seen in front of a livery stable in conversation with Charles Williams, a former Salem man, who spoke to Minto as the latter drove by. Learning from William that Minto was the Sheriff from Salem, the stranger was off like a shot for the dense underbrush along the river bank. Telling Deputy Esch to drive up the road, Minto plunged into the underbrush after the fugitive, who finally took to a wheat field. The officers closed in on him and the fellow seeing a man on either side of him, armed with a gun, threw up his hands. He had thrown away his revolver, but the Sheriff forced him to tell where it had been thrown and the weapon was recovered.

There was found on Arstall a memorandum book containing clippings and memoranda of various kinds and a pocketbook in which was found a check on Ladd & Bush for \$5 in favor of James Altman and signed by G. W. Chapman. Arstall has been working for Chapman, but the signature was forged. In the memorandum book was a formula for the eradication of ink, a memorandum regarding a new process for cutting steel and the names and addresses of people in various parts of the country, including "Bailey, Dairy and Food Commissioner--a live one."

Arstall was received at the Oregon State Prison on April 16, 1907, from Tillamook County, to serve five years for forgery. On July 12, 1909, he was granted a conditional pardon by Governor Benson, and was released.

Under the terms of a law passed by the last session of the Legislature the crime of attempting while armed with a dangerous weapon to hold up any person, is punishable by a prison sentence of from ten years to life.

Arstall is the young man who was arrested in this county for cashing forged checks, and who went through quite an experience. Sheriff Crenshaw arrested him by overtaking the stage on which he was leaving the county. He broke jail twice, but was recaptured by the sheriff at the point of the truck he was driving and he had gained his freedom after he had gained his liberty. After his second jail break he managed to get out of the county, although the sheriff was hot on his trail and came within a few yards of overtaking him one dark night, when Arstall abandoned the horse he was riding and which he had stolen and took to the woods. He was eventually captured by the Indian police on the reservation. Arstall played the insanity dodge while in jail waiting his trial, which did not pan out as he expected, the sheriff having caught on to the trick he was playing. Arstall pleaded guilty and Judge Galloway sentenced him to serve five years in the penitentiary. Sheriff Crenshaw saw Arstall in the penitentiary when he took Nordstrom there, and he appeared to be very penitent. An effort was then being made to secure a patrol for him, and the first known here that Governor Benson had granted it was the news of Arstall's arrest. What with hav-

ing to go back to the penitentiary to serve the remainder of the five years, he has to face the charges for the hold up and two indictments in this county, and this is liable to keep him in the penitentiary for a number of years, where such characters should be kept.
