Gov. Johnson of Minnesota thinks the tariff question should be settled and put out of politics. The strongest argument in favor of that programme is that when the tariff question goes the Democratic party will go with it.

Senator Aldrich and Congressman Payne have had a tilt in conference over the tariff on hides. There are other senators and congressmen vitally interested in whether hides shall be taken off or left on other things than the free list.

The anti-suffragettes of Massachusetts are to invade England in retaliation for the invasion of this country by the suffragettes of that country. In the face of such a danger, England may forget her fear of invasion by the German Army.

The London Times is correct in saying that the influx of Americans into Canada is surprisingly large. It is probably correct, too, in predicting that the movement will continue for several years longer. About 70,000 Americans are expected to cross the line in the calendar year 1909, moving into the Northwestern provinces chiefly. They are going there because they can buy land for a fifth, or even a tenth, of the amount which they receive for their farms, per acre, in the United States. But the Canadian and British statistics omit to tell how many disgusted Americans return to their own country after an experience of a year or two in Canada. That the number is considerable is shown from reports of arrivals here and there, from time to time. These American emigrants forget that the land which they buy is no richer than that which they left in this country, while in most cases it is much farther from the market. The returns which Canadian farms yield, per acre, are smaller than in the United States. The climate of Canada is less hospitable. The society, the laws and the customs are alien. All these things are discovered quickly after crossing the line.

DR. OLIVER'S GREAT REVIVALS.
The Man and His Methods, as Seen by Rev. H. G. Bond, D. D., Litt. D., Girard, Kansas.

Probably never in the history of any state have so many great revivals been conducted by one evangelist as have been conducted by Rev. French E. Oliver, D.D., in the state of Kansas. His work in the state began almost eight years ago in Cottonwood Falls, and although scores of meetings have been held in Kansas since that time by Dr. Oliver, as well as in other states, all have been crowned with absolute success. While other evangelists have had great denominations back of their meetings, using all their official machinery to secure dates for their workers, Evangelist Oliver has conducted strictly non-sectarian union meetings without any alliance with any combination of denominationalism or other evangelists.

I have known Dr. Oliver for about seven years, and have been in close and personal touch with him a considerable part of the time, and can therefore describe him and his work as a preacher, Evangelist and lecturer from an insight into his character, gained from years of personal acquaintance. Having been pastor at different points where he has conducted great union revival campaigns with phenomenal results, I have had opportunity of analyzing the man and his methods.

Probably no meeting and no evangelist since the days of the apostles was ever opposed more strenuously or persistently by unbelief, indifference and the devil himself, than the work and the worker—Dr. Oliver—in Girard, Kansas. Yet, notwithstanding the tremendous odds against him; the organized opposition which he was obliged to meet and overcome in order that victory might be snatched from the jaws of defeat the foul weapons used in personal attacks against him—Dr. Oliver was at all times master of the situation, and was enabled to lead the people of God to phenomenal success—the meeting resulting in 500 conversions.

Dr. Oliver is a man of most striking personality—towering like a giant, head and shoulders, above the average man, standing six feet four inches in height, with broad shoulders, as straight as an Indian; his body well knit and full of muscles, nerves and virility, a classical face, firm jaws, lips that close like a vice, a chin that denotes strength of will and firmness of character; a head that would answer for a Grecian model and eyes that are steel gray—the truest of all colors, so the sages say—piercing and searching the souls of his listeners through and through. Dr. Oliver's greater strength lies in the quality of his mind and soul—God has been very generous to him in giving him a superb mental power house, and the mental machinery has so well put together and is controlled with such consummate skill that he



opens to his hearers the literature, history, science, biography, philosophy, theology, poetry and art of all lands with the ease of the great master that he is. As a lecturer, Dr. Oliver has few peers and no superiors on the American platform today. It has been by privilege to listen to some of the greatest preachers and lecturers of our times, and as a teacher of oratory I know something of oratory and dramatic art, I therefore think he takes rank easily with any and all of the great pulpit or platform orators of the country. He is a complete master of the English language, possessing a vocabulary that is Shakespearean in its scope—but his messages do not run all to words, as is the case with so many pulpit and platform celebrities, they are replete with thought and delivered with a power and energy and force of will that carries conviction to the most obstinate mind. His style is at once catchy, original and pleasing. He is blessed with a voice that can be heard in the largest auditoriums; a voice that is deep, rich and ringing; a voice that has the general's command in it; a voice that appeals to you and wins you; a voice that often has tears in it; a voice that plays on the heartstrings of his auditors; a voice that sometimes crashes like mighty artillery as he hurls his crashing thunderbolts of truth against sin and unrighteousness.

It has been my observation that the results of the great meetings conducted by Evangelist Oliver are to the greatest degree permanent in their effects on the life of the community in which they are held; new church buildings and Y. M. C. A. buildings mark the trail of Dr. Oliver in many states. There is always a general cleaning up along the lines of social purity and temperance; and always a fumigation of municipal affairs when they need attention. His plan of campaign is a fight to the finish against all forms of evil, no compromise is offered to evil doers. The Gospel he preaches is not a veneer, but the gospel of regeneration.
