Tillamook County and City are making steady growth. At this season of the year it behooves everybody to be careful in setting out fire, for most of us know what great excitement was caused a few years ago in this county when some careless hunters left a fire in the timber and which resulted in a serious conflagration and a great loss to the timber owners, but it also resulted in a serious menace to all farm and city property. Therefore, it is imperative that the utmost precaution be taken the next two months to prevent forest fires, for there is no telling what loss of life and property may result after a forest fire gets fairly underway. It is the careless hunters and campers who invariably cause forest fires, and it is that class which need careful watching at this season of the year. The people of the county, too, should also take a more lively interest in fire protection, and it would not be a bad idea if the settlers in each district would organize and keep a watchful eye upon all fires that are set out. The dairymen of this county are much interested in the prevention of fire as the timber owners, for a great number of them know from experience that their homes, barns and hay are in jeopardy directly a forest fire is started. It is then a matter of great importance to both settlers and timber owners that they should work together for a common protection against fire.

A CLEVER MAN WITH A RIFLE.

Captain Bartlett Does Some Remarkable Stunts.

Captain G. E. Bartlett came in on Wednesday, and is giving a demonstration this afternoon, showing that he is a crack shot. This is what the Mountain View Leader says of him: Captain George E. Bartlett, ex-United States marshal and scout, known among the Sioux Indians of the Dakotas as "Wounded Knee," was shooting up the



town here Thursday. He is a bad man with a gun. He isn't one of the sort of bad men, however, who shoot just for pure cussedness, but he is one of the very few men in the world who can shoot a rifle without missing the object shot at, even though the object be as small as the shadow of a mosquito's eyebrow. The captain is the coast representative of the Peters Cartridge Company and the exhibitions he gives are for the purpose of demonstrating the superiority of the cartridges made by his company

and the different kinds of powder used. After a preliminary, and very instructive talk on the various kinds of powder and cartridges used, the captain proceeded to demonstrate. Using a Remington auto-loading rifle shooting 30 30 cartridges, he first shot at pieces of brick thrown in the air and the pieces were reduced to powder. He shot at a quart tin can filled with water and sealed, thrown in the air, and the bullet struck the can square in the end and reduced it to a scrap of tin, while the water disappeared in thin vapor. Some pieces of boiler plate about an inch and a half square and a quarter of an inch thick, thrown into the air, and the 30 30 bullets bored clean holes through them as though they were putty. With a 32 20 semi smokeless cartridge, using a Stevens Ideal Rifle, he did some pretty work in reflection shooting, and with the use of a small mirror, hit objects without looking at them, holding the gun in many different positions. He then gave a demonstration with a 22-calibre rifle, using cartridges which he had bought in town at different stores. This was the most wonderful work he did and best showed his remarkable skill as a marksman. Little bits of brick as small as the end of your thumb, slot machine slugs, pennies and all sorts of little things like that were thrown into the air and the unerring marksman hit every one of them and sent them singing into space.

To show the cleanliness of the Peters semi-smokeless cartridge, the captain fired two hundred shots from a 22 calibre rifle without cleaning or stopping only long enough to fill the magazine, and when the two hundred shots had been fired the gun was as clean as though not more than one shot had been fired. The demonstration concluded with an exhibition of shotgun shooting at which the captain showed himself to be an expert as with a rifle. He filled the magazine of a Remington auto-loading gun with mixed shells of semi-smokeless and different grades of nitro powders, and shot at tin cans and other objects both stationary and thrown into the air. A tin can thrown into the air had all the shots in the magazine emptied into it before it got a chance to "light."

As deputy United States Marshal, Captain Bartlett had a fight with a bad gang of horse thieves in 1883 in Dakota, and in the scrimmage he was shot in the knee. Afterwards he conducted a trading store near the Pine Ridge Agency and the Indians gave him the name of "Wounded Knee" on account of his slight limp, the result of his wound. Personally the captain is a most interesting gentleman and has a rich fund of historical knowledge of much value. He has been with the Peters Company for ten years, and is now permanently located in San Francisco as the representative of the firm.

RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS.
