Shall that portion of Tillamook County, State of Oregon, described as beginning at the North West corner of section 18, in Township 1 South of Range 9 West, W.M., and running thence West to Tillamook Bay; thence in a straight line to a point where the East line of Section 16, in Township 1 South of Range 10 West intersects Tillamook Bay; thence 1 mile to the South West corner of Section 24, in Township 1 South of Range 10 West, W.M., and running thence South 3 miles to the South West corner of Section 14, in Township 2 South of Range 10 West, W.M., running thence East 3 miles to the South East corner of Section 16, Township 2 South of Range 10 West, W.M., running thence East 11 miles to the East line of Section 34, Township 2 South of Range 8 West; thence South 3 miles to the South West corner of Section 34, Township 2 South of Range 8 West; thence East to the East line of Tillamook County; thence North along the Eastern boundary line of Tillamook County to the North East corner of Section 31, township 2 North of Range 5 West; thence West 19 miles to the North West corner of Section 31, township 2 North of Range 5 West; thence South 9 miles to the South West corner of Section 7, in Township 2 North of Range 8 West; to place of beginning, be incorporated as a municipal corporation, to be known as the "PORT OF TILLAMOOK," regular session held in 1909, entitled "An Act to provide for the incorporation under general law of Ports in counties bordering upon bays or rivers navigable from the sea or containing bays or rivers, navigable from the sea and to provide for the manner of incorporating such Ports and defining the powers of Ports so incorporated."

Mrs. Donaldson Plays "The Knocker."

[TO THE EDITOR TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.]  
DEAR SIR,—I wish to call attention to some of the assertions of the Herald in regard to local option and its results, which says:

LOCAL OPTION.

The way local option works in Tillamook county was well shown up in the Justice's Court during the last few days. A number of boys from 15 to 20 were brought before the court as witnesses or prisoners to answer a charge of burglary. It seems that any boy of any age can send out and purchase all the liquor he desires, and it has been the habit for boys to have meetings places and hold regular beer drinking bouts. They testify that they borrow from one another, returned beer to each other, sold beer to each other, and got drunk, sometimes they sang, sometimes they were so full they could not sing and fell down, and in this particular case, when some of them got pretty well loaded up they went back during the night and broke in and "swiped" fifty or sixty bottles of beer and carried them home in two gunny sacks. The evidence was conflicting as to whether in this particular case they had the authority to help themselves or not.

Now, mind you, most of these boys were school boys who did not think they were doing any harm but only a lark, and just what they had always done, viz: borrow beer and return it or pay for it. If the residents of this county cannot see from this, and other matters that come under their attention from day to day, that local option—as local option is in Tillamook County—is a farce and worse than a farce, that it is fast ruining the youth of the county, they must be blind.

At the present time more liquor is being sent into the county, than was ever consumed during the saloon days, and an immense mail order business is done with our boys. Any boy can order a barrel or a case of liquor if he has the price, and it does not have to come in his name but to a private mark, and this liquor will be cached somewhere where the boys can get together and drink it, teaching them not only to be liquor drinkers, but to be law breakers.

An open saloon that can be regulated is far preferable to local option, with the county full of law breaking bootleggers, and our boys being taught to have no reverence for the law.

Local option is a screaming farce in Tillamook County.

Is not this intended as a strong argument in favor of the destructive saloon and against the saving qualities of local option? Who are blind, the residents of the county or the Herald man? Can any sane person blame a good law for drunkenness or thieving and other outlawery? No, the outlaw class are the cause of this state of affairs and our salaried, sleepy officers are to blame, not local option. If the interested voters had put interested men in office who would have done their sworn duty and not work in sympathy with the outlaws and drinking class, but look out for all lawbreakers and bring them to justice, there would be less disgraceful conduct to report. The law is not to blame, but the officers that refuse to enforce the law. Local option cannot take the blame for such procedures as were reported in last week's Herald, as such or similar conduct has been carried on here for years. Long before local option came into force drunkenness and thefts disgraced us. But the Herald would not have noticed it then. It would only have been considered a natural consequence and not worth space in a paper so crowded with the people's best interests. The idea that sensible, thinking people could be made to believe that local option or any other law was the cause of such doings as the Herald is pleased to report and then declare that if the residents cannot see just as the Herald tells them to see they must be blind. They, surely, are too blind to be led by a blind leader of the blind. The writer has lived in this county longer than any of the Herald force and am sorry to say such reports as appeared in last week's Herald or similar ones have been of yearly occurrence. It is the result of bad men's bad example and bad very bad influence, that is having such bad effect on our boys, and not local option as our Herald friend would make believe, which, he says, is teaching our boys not only to be liquor drinkers but to be law breakers. This state of affairs is not new, and local option is in no way responsible. And as to the boys sending away and getting all the liquor he has

the money to pay for, would the open saloon prevent that or would the removal of the local option law in any way improve matters? Certainly not. Who are the outlaws who lead and teach out-lawry? Who has a right to furnish boys with liquor and who has a right to protect our boys from such destructive purchase first, is it not the liquor dealers and their agents who know their business depends on a continual addition of new recruits of hundreds of thousands to swell the ranks and replace the thousands who fill drunkard's graves every year, besides the thousands of drunken paupers who are no longer profitable? Oh no, my friends, this is no new occurrence sprang up as the result of local option. But a very old process, one that has been in operation a very long time and it is at work day and night, year in and year out, this soul destroying agency, hastening men and women unprepared into eternity. The whole arrangement is a curse to the whole world, a very, very great curse, an awful curse, and one that the people cannot be too hasty in removing. And they can remove it if they will, and in the meantime the officers of the law can do a great deal to protect those who need protection if they care to do so, but from appearance they do not care and will not do anything for our boy's protection. But I will leave it with the thinking public hoping they will give it their best attention.

DEPOSIT TO BE MINED.

Nehalem "Beeswax" Found to be Ozocerite.

That the product found in the sand at the mouth of the Nehalem river popularly believed to be beeswax from a wrecked Spanish galleon, is valuable substance known to chemistry as ozocerite, was the statement made yesterday by J. J. Walter, president of the Necarnev City Hydrocarbon Oil Company, a corporation organized to exploit the product. For years the visitors to that coast have picked up the wax like lumps that have strewn the beach there. The general opinion has prevailed that it was beeswax brought from Manila for one of the Spanish settlements in California and that the ship was wrecked there. The discovery was made as early as 1813 by the Indians who brought specimens of the substance to the trading post founded by John Jacob Asto, at the mouth of the Columbia.

Prior to last April a company of which Mr. Walter was a member was engaged in selling lots near where the discovery was made. At that time Kit Carson the famous scout, now employed as an assayer by the Government, visited the place and announced that the supposed beeswax was none other than ozocerite, a product of hydrocarbon oil, found only in South America and in small quantities in Northern Europe.

At Nehalem, the oil comes from a great depth to the surface and in passing through the sand the cruder elements are worked out. This is used mainly as a lubricant. It is also used in the preparation of certain drugs. The records used by the phonographs are made from the unrefined product. Machinery has been purchased by Mr. Walter's company and the work of developing the property is to be undertaken at once—Oregonian.
