McIndoe says that the commerce in the bay does not warrant \$2,000,000 expenditures, which would be necessary for the work.  
 A suit was filed in the circuit court on Wednesday by James Walton jr. trustee, plaintiff, against Matron T. Chance, in which plaintiff wants defendant to set forth the value of his claim to certain property in section 21, and 20, tp. 1 north. The complaint sets out that John F. Shorey, Arthur L. Ridehaigh are now organizing a corporation, under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oregon, to be known as the Garibaldi beach Company, and the plaintiff holds the legal title to said premises and the whole thereof in trust to be conveyed to said corporation when the same shall have been organized.  
 Sheriff Crenshaw left on Wednesday morning for Salem in his auto, taking A. E. Burroughs to the state penitentiary and C. R. Ostrander to the asylum. The sheriff was accompanied by his wife. He had no deputy along to assist him, for he placed the insane man and the prisoner in the back seat of the auto, and shackling them so that they could not escape, he started out without assistance. The insane person was not dangerous, but his mania was a desire to kill himself.
