### Editorial Snap Shots.

Rah! Rah! Rah! For the new Port of Tillamook.

Watch the lumber going in every direction, which is the best proof that something is doing in Tillamook county and city this year.

Labor day was celebrated on Monday in Tillamook County with most everybody at the grind stone, as usual, and this included Old Bossy as well.

The little words: "A title," and not "The title," may have a great deal to do with knocking the pins from under the Langworthy local option case pending in the supreme court.

If Orley Kellow should come to the city with his fighting duds on, determined to protect his character, we are inclined to think that a couple of editors would soon be down on their marrow bones.

The most remarkable news of the week is that two Americans claim to have reached the North Pole—the first, Dr. F. A. Clark, and the second Commander Robert E. Perry. The latter, however, claims that the former did not reach the pole. We guess they did not meet and shake hands at the pole, but it is to be hoped that both can prove that they reached there.

It is well that the people of this county should know that Tillamook has the Willamette valley "skinned" for good roads, the sheriff being authority for this assertion. It is this case now, what will it be after a few more years, for great improvements are taking place in road building in Tillamook county. One thing which makes travel on the public roads in the summer and fall so delightful, little or no dust is encountered. Those who are in the habit of complaining about bad roads in this county should take a trip over the dry, dusty roads, full of chuck holes, in the Willamette valley at this season of the year, and then they would sing quite a different song about Tillamook roads. And yet another instance of the good roads in this county. Some parties who came from Portland on Monday in their auto, said that Tillamook county was deserving of great praise for its fine roads.

We understand that several sets of candidates, recommended to form the Port of Tillamook, found their way from this city to Governor Benson's sanctum at Salem, some of whom would have been obnoxious to quite a number of persons in this city had the governor appointed them, while others recommended but not appointed would have made active members of the Port. Governor Benson used good judgment in the selection of representative men to serve on the Port, and we must congratulate him on the selection he made, and we must also congratulate the members of the new Port for the honor the governor conferred upon them. The appointments meet the approval of the Headlight with out any exceptions, and we believe the members of the new Port will work harmoniously together, not in the interests of any individuals, but in the interests of the city, its commerce, industries, future development, and, above all, a deep water harbor and a straight 9-foot channel from Tillamook City to the bay.

"Chamberlain, of Oregon, Democrat, voted with Aldrich sixteen times; against him 85 times." So a Democratic organ tells us. To fill out the sum of this useful information it should have added that Chamberlain, Democrat, of Oregon, voted with Aldrich on all subjects in which protection of Oregon's products were involved, and against him when the protection of commodities of New England and other states was concerned. The list of their products is more extensive than the list of ours; hence Chamberlain voted more often against Aldrich than for him, but stood right in for protection for Oregon—until it came to the final vote—then voted against the entire bill, and Oregon at last owed the protection it gets for its product to the leprous Aldrich. The tariff seems to be both a local question and a political juggle. Did Chamberlain want protection for the products of Oregon, or not? He is on both sides of the question. Bourne said, freely, that he didn't know any thing about the subject, and would leave it to those who did know, and voted with Aldrich, therefore, straight through.—Oregonian.

No one could expect anything different from Chamberlain. A senator who will vote to protect Oregon products when a bill is pending and then vote against the protection of Oregon products when it came to a final vote is a slippery fellow. But, then, the people of Oregon are only getting what they voted for.

Unfortunately for Tillamook County and City, there are several individuals in this city who are constantly "knocking" and fault-finding and pulling down and besmirching the characters of respectable citizens who have resided for a long number of years in the county. It is the same old rule or ruin spirit which have prevailed for years. It was seen in the repeated attacks of the Herald on the co-operative creamery associations, the attacks on the engineer of the Argo until that individual threatened to mop the floor with the Herald man, when it immediately stopped. Now it is the county court and those who are working for the county who are coming in for a large share of abuse from the same organ. It does not matter what the county or city authorities may do, there are those who are constantly back-biting, fault finding and accusing them of pilfering or stealing public money. Invariably it is the "knockers" and fault-finders who need to be watched. But this is no time to keep on "knocking" and belly-aching. The city and the county have made substantial growth this year, and it needs enterprising boosters who have faith in the city, the county and the people to keep the good work of boosting the county going. Yet the editor of the Herald, who is but a recent arrival in the county, has undertaken to besmirch the character of Commissioner Boddyfelt, who has resided in the county for 40 years, and Orley Kellow, an industrious settler living in the south end of the county. All fair minded persons will admit that these attacks on the dairy interests, the county court and others is doing the county a lot of harm, and especially at a time when everybody ought to be boosting the country for all they are worth.

### Governor Appoints Port.

Governor Benson on Wednesday morning made the appointments of five members to serve on the Port of Tillamook, selecting James Walton, H. T. Botta, M. F. Leach, A. G. Beals and Dave Fitzpatrick. Quite a number of persons aspired to the position, as numerous letters reached the governor recommending different sets of aspirants. The appointments made by the governor should meet with approval, as the new Port is composed of some of our leading citizens and is a representative body.

### Almost a Serious Explosion.

The Tillamook Lumber Manufacturing Co.'s saw mill had to close down on Wednesday morning owing to the tubes in one of the boilers leaking, and on making an examination it was found that what might have been a most serious accident was averted. For some cause the water gauge did not work, and although the glass showed plenty of water, there was no water in the boiler, with a big fire in the furnaces. The expansion caused the tubes to leak and it will take several days to fix them, and this cannot be done until a tube expander arrives from Portland. During the shut down several improvements will be made in the mill and a new warehouse for dressed lumber will be built east of the present warehouse.

### Another Fatal Logging Accident.

Another fatal accident occurred on Saturday morning in the timber logging camp, when Lea McFall survived about an hour and a quarter after receiving fatal injuries falling timber. McFall was partly on the spring board and the stump on the side of a hill as a tree fell over, but striking another tree in the tops the butt knocked back. McFall's companions called to him to jump, but losing his balance he fell into the canyon, the tree struck him as he fell on the ground, mashing him up considerably. His right arm was broken off at the elbow, both legs were broken and a hole was punctured in his skull behind his right ear, and notwithstanding these serious injuries, he lived over an hour. Deceased was a son of Mr. and Mrs. T. L. McFall, was 24 years of age, and was born in Missouri, but had resided in Tillamook most of his life. The remains were buried on Sunday in the Bay View cemetery, Rev. M. E. Beeler, pastor of the U. B. church, conducting the religious services.

### Obituary.

Mrs. Rebecca Jane Deane died at Bay City on Saturday evening, aged 52 years. She had been a member of the M. E. church since January, 1890. Her many friends in Nehalem and Bay City will long mourn for her. Her husband, Alfred Deane, died two years ago. She was a member of the Rebeccas, who assisted in the funeral service. Rev. A. B. Calder gave the address at the M. E. church. The interment was at the Oddfellows' cemetery.
