FATAL BLAST EXPLOSION.

One Man Killed and Several Injured, Including Contractor Sweeney.

A most serious and fatal explosion occurred on Tuesday on the Pacific Railway and Navigation Co.'s railroad at Nehalem, and so severe was the shock that people in the vicinity thought that an earthquake had taken place. A cut was being made on what is known as the Kinney place on the Nehalem river, and about 800 feet below Contractor Sweeney's railroad camp. A charge of about five tons of powder was being used and Mr. Sweeney gave orders that plenty of time should be given for the men to get out of the way before the charge was fired. It seems that this was not done, and immediately after someone called out "Fire" a terrific explosion occurred. Large pieces of rock filled the air with as much force as though they had been shot from a cannon, tearing everything before them. It was thought that the blast would go into the river, but instead of doing so it went in the direction of the camp, the rock and debris rounding down and hurling rocks right through the buildings. Several men were injured, including Contractor Sweeney, who was struck between the shoulders. Joe Caccello, an Italian, received the most serious injuries and died five hours after. The blacksmith was injured by being jammed up against a building when a team became scared by the explosion and ran away.

Largest Barn in County Burned.

The fire fiend wiped out Charley Ray's barn at Cloverdale on Tuesday evening, doing damage to the amount of about \$5,000 damages, with no insurance. One of the barns was the largest in Tillamook. Pete Lamar, who lives near the barn, was the first to discover the fire, which originated in the large barn, and in a few minutes it was one mass of fire. Fortunately it was after milking time and the cows had been turned out in the pasture, otherwise the loss would have been much greater, for the barn was full of hay and it burned very rapidly. All hands turned their attention to saving what they could in the horse barn, removing all the stock, implements, etc., before the fire consumed it. It is not known how the fire originated, but it is supposed that the embers became overheated or that a spontaneous combustion had taken place in the hay owing to placing it in the barn before it was properly cured, which was the cause of several barns loaded with hay being burned a few years ago. Mr. Ray was in this city when the fire took place. It is a most serious loss to him, for besides destroying his barns, it also destroyed his winter feed for his dairy cows.

First Meeting of Port.

The first meeting of the newly appointed Port of Tillamook was held on Monday in the court house, when Commissioner James Walton, M. F. Leach and Dave Fitzpatrick were present. After organizing, the Port proceeded to elect permanent officers, and there appearing to be a mutual agreement as to this, the following officers were elected in a bunch: President—H. T. Botts. First Vice-President—A. G. Beals. 2nd Vice-President—D. Fitzpatrick. Treasurer—M. F. Leach. Secretary—James Walton.

Lots were drawn for the short and long terms, as follows: Short term, Botts and Fitzpatrick; long term, Walton, Beals and Leach.

Secretary Walton was instructed to communicate with the Rivers and Harbor Committee protesting against the adverse report of Captain McIndoe as to the improvement of Tillamook bar. He was also instructed to write to the

two previous Ports and have all papers, records and money turned over to the present Port.

The first Thursday in each month, at eight o'clock, is the date for holding meetings, and special meetings can be held upon the call of the president, vice-president or secretary.
