

Editorial Snap Shots.

Cut it out—all factional and personal feelings—and work together and boost the city.

The personal of the Port of Tillamook might have been different had Chamberlain been governor still.

We are wondering, when Webb Maddux gets into the delivery business in this city whether he will be a Port of Tillamook "booster" or "buster?"

The new Port of Tillamook appears to realize that if anything is to be accomplished in getting an appropriation for the improvement of the bar the Port will have to make a strenuous fight for it.

It is no good taking further notice of the "knockers," for there are generally so many fault-finding cranks in most every town, anyway. The booster's vim and shout will make them feel pretty small.

There are no "knockers" amongst the dairymen who received the big checks for their July milk, but those who are making an unsuccessful attempt to "knock" the dairy industry are not engaged in dairying.

The biggest and most successful boosters we know of this week in Tillamook County are the dairymen with the big checks for July milk. Cheese is making the county famous, but it is the big money for cheese which talks and helps boost Tillamook.

Boosters get busy. The city needs a commodious, nicely furnished commercial club, with reception room, billiard and card rooms, reading room and bowling alley. So get busy, boys, for we need a club where the boosters can associate and enjoy themselves.

Edward Henry Harriman is dead and the newspapers, which censured him most unmercifully for a number of years, are now singing his praises. It appears to be the custom, however, with editors to give some men hell while they are living and then laud them when they are dead. Why wouldn't a change about be more appropriate, for to give a man taffy after he is dead when he did not deserve it is a practice altogether to common? Mr. Harriman was, no doubt, a genius in the railroad world, but when President Roosevelt made the statement that the wizard was an "undesirable citizen" we suppose he must have had some information which caused him to make that sensational remark about such a prominent individual.

Congressman W. C. Hawley, who was instrumental in introducing a resolution in the house to have the engineer's report for the improvement of Tillamook bar reconsidered, does, no doubt, feel as much disappointed as the people of this county in the adverse report of Captain McIndoe. Mr. Hawley has taken a most lively interest in the Coast Counties and is doing his utmost to secure harbor improvements for them. It will be no easy matter for him to resurrect and have the engineer's report reconsidered, unless he can obtain the co-operation of some of the congressmen in the Eastern or Middle States, and in that way override the engineer's report. The engineers does not take a logical view of the situation in saying that the commerce does not justify the expenditure, while, as a matter of fact the timber resources of the county does justify the expenditure.

The editor of the Headlight will, provided that half a dozen or more business men will assist, take up the matter and start a Commercial Club. It is something that this city is sadly in need of, especially at this time, for it is making substantial progress, and this appears to be the most opportune time to drop all factional fights and work together in the interest of Tillamook city and county. That is one object we have in view in wanting a club started on a get together common ground basis. Another thing, it will enable business men to assimilate and enjoy themselves for a few hours together, and with a Ladies' Auxiliary connected with the club, we are convinced that it would afford plenty of enjoyment the coming winter as well as devise ways and means to improve the city. Besides, a club room is the proper place to entertain visitors who may come here to invest or desire information, and where the business men can meet and talk to them. Heretofore, they have fallen into the hands of one or two or a real estate agent. This is enough, probably, to say about a club at this time. What we want now is a half a dozen business men who will offer their services in perfecting a temporary organization and start a commercial club.

The newspapers which are "knocking" because the county court is building a bridge across Tillamook river ought to be showering thanks upon that body—not abuse. When the bridge is built and the new road to Netarts is completed it will be a great benefit to Tillamook City, as anyone with the least common sense will readily see. For years those living in this vicinity have complained about the difficulties and the bad roads in reaching Netarts, and now that the county court has started in with a definite plan to carry out a long desired improvement the little silly, silly little individuals and editors keep "knocking." To "knock" anything which is of vital

interest to Tillamook City is certainly poor business judgment. Every sensible business man in the city can see far enough ahead to know that the bridge across the Tillamook river and a good road to Netarts will help the business of this city and help to develop Netarts. No one can deny this. When the railroad is completed and there is a large amount of summer travel into Tillamook, there will be a continual travel between this city and Netarts over the new bridge and road. If this "knocking" and abuse of the county court on account of the bridge and road to Netarts is to be kept up, that body is not liable to undertake any more improvements which would be a direct benefit to Tillamook City.

MORE BIG CHECKS FOR TILLAMOOK DAIRYMEN.

Profitable and Successful Dairying Brings Big Returns for July.

Below will be found some interesting figures and information concerning profitable and successful dairying in Tillamook county which should not only be interesting to those engaged in the industry, but it shows conclusively that this is an idea section of country for dairying and that the industry is a money maker for the dairymen, giving them a monthly pay roll which is growing larger every year, for this year the amount of cheese manufactured will be valued at \$500,000. The figures given below are for one month, July, giving the amount of checks paid to the dairymen over \$200 at a number of the factories. The fifteen factories, of which Carl Haberlach acts as secretary and salesman, makes another fine showing for July, and the same can be said of some of the other factories. The satisfactory manner in which the cheese business is being carried on in Tillamook County, and the promptness with which the dairymen receive their monthly checks is in marked contrast when they had to wait several months for their pay and butter fat was down to 12 cents a pound in the Summer months, whereas it is now climbing up to 40 cents, some factories for the month of August having reached that amount.

The amount of money received at the above factories for July, of which Carl Haberlach acts as secretary and salesman, was \$55,536, which is a fine showing for one month's business. And to show how prices for cheese have been kept up, the returns for May were \$55,023 and for June \$56,104, making a total revenue of \$166,663.00 for 3 months for the above factories. Tillamook Creamery, the largest factory in this group, shows that prices have been well maintained, with little fluctuation, for the receipts were: May, \$9,636; June, \$9,763; July, \$9,822; August, \$9,425; being a total of \$38,656 for four months.

The highest price paid for per 100 lbs. milk around Tillamook City is \$1.44½ paid by Clover Leaf. The highest paid in the Southern end of the county is \$1.38 paid by Meda, with Three Rivers and Ocean Park following closely with \$1.36 each. Ray's factory at Cloverdale paid \$1.33 or 35c. for butter fat. Red Clover paid 34.8c. for butter fat.

By a careful study of the above table it will be noticed that some ranchers received more milk from comparatively less cows than others did. This is caused by the difference in the lay of the land and the difference in the breed of cattle; bottom land and Holstein cows producing the most milk.

Holstein and Durham breeds are the most used in this locality. However, the Durham is not a good dairy cow and many ranchers are working into the Holstein breed as fast as possible. The reason that so many of the Durham breed are in this country is because of the fact that but a few years ago, cattle were raised for beef instead of for dairy purposes. The installing of the right breed of cattle on our many ranches will greatly increase the cheese production here.

Frank Worthington has a cow that is 7-8 Holstein, which, it is claimed, produces more dollars than any cow in the state. She produced \$150 worth of milk for cheese making purposes in 10 months last season.
