TILLAMOOK CHEESE WINS. Red Clover Creamery Co. Awarded First and Second Prizes at the State Fair.

NECK SAVED AGAIN.

Supreme Court Interposes on Behalf of Hembree.

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 21.—The Supreme Court today handed down an opinion, written by Chief Justice Moore, reversing the case of the state vs. A. J. Hembree. This is the notorious Tillamook County murder case, in which the defendant, Hembree, was accused of killing his wife and daughter and then burning the bodies to destroy the evidence of the crime. Hembree, it will be remembered, was first convicted of manslaughter for killing his daughter. After serving one year of an indeterminate sentence, Hembree was paroled by Governor Chamberlain. Returning to Yamhill County he was rearrested, charged with murdering his wife, and upon the trial of the case at Dallas, in Polk County, Judge Burnett presiding, the defendant was found guilty of murder in the first degree and sentenced to be hanged.

In his opinion Chief Justice Moore holds that "proof of the commission of other offenses having no connection with the crime for which a defendant is on trial, is irrelevant and inadmissible."

The principal ground on which the case is reversed was the error of the lower court in admitting the testimony of M. H. Larsen, the Tillamook hotel-keeper. From the testimony of this witness the jury was led to infer that Hembree had been guilty of improper conduct with his daughter, from which more inferences were drawn, finally resulting in a motive for the crime.

New scientists are again talking about whether Nehalem beach beeswax is really beeswax or ozocerite. How would it do to call the referendum on the question?
