

Editorial Snap Shots.

The Cook-Pearry controversy as to who reached the North Pole first is getting fierce.

The "Toot, toot, toot," of the locomotive on the railroad sounds good, but it will sound much better this time next when it will be "All aboard."

Don't keep knocking, Bro. Turner. Be a live, wide-awake booster, for there is plenty of room in the booster's band wagon for Bro. Turner to be become one of the bosses.

Governor John A. Johnson, of Minnesota, for years a country editor, recently said in the Youth's Companion: "The school-teacher, the minister, the young college graduate, and numerous other people about the town know, or think they know, how to run a newspaper better than does the editor."

And there are others.

"Joy Rides" in autos, no doubt, are quite pleasant for those who indulge in them, but to steal and wreck the auto is only another instance of the prevalence of crime in this city. At the next term of the circuit court the parties should be given a "joy ride" to the state penitentiary, for it is a wonder that it did not culminate in a fatal "joy ride" similar to that in Multnomah county.

It was only natural to expect that a large number of people in Tillamook county felt disgusted with the decision of the supreme court in the Hembree case. The supreme court has decided that the evidence relating to another crime, and which is supposed to be the motives for the murders, cannot be admitted as evidence. This is where the prosecution is handicapped in this case. However, the case will have to be tried again, for it would be a disgrace to civilization to open the prison doors and allow him to go free.

The U'Ren style of political bossism is advocating a constitutional amendment to take the election of sheriffs, district attorneys and state officers out of the people's hands and give the governor the power to appoint them. Those who so blindly followed the U'Ren fallacies will readily see that this would create such a monster political machine that it would eclipse all other boss rule ever attempted in Oregon. Surely it is about time for the republicans who went daft over the U'Ren fallacies to regain their senses and adhere strictly to representative government.

Attorney McCain, in sending the news of the supreme court's decision in the Hembree case, sent his respects to the editor of the Headlight. It is another victory for the attorneys, and will, no doubt, cheat the hangman out of a job for a time, but it is cases like this which make people disgusted with the manner in which the courts set aside verdicts in murder cases and which force people to take the law into their own hands and lynch law follows. The newspaper reports does not say, however, that the verdict was set aside on account of insufficiency of evidence.

Will Oregon go "dry" next year? That is a question which is being asked and discussed quite freely of late. There is considerable doubt, however, as to whether the Anti Saloon League will be able to carry the state in 1910, for the reason that Multnomah county is sure to poll a heavy vote against making the state "dry." A great many surprises have taken place in recent years in voting on the liquor question and it may be that when it comes to a question of making the entire state "dry" another surprise will be in store for the "wets."

Judge L. T. Harris is spoken of as a probable successor to Judge Beau on the Supreme bench. From what we know of Judge Harris as a most able jurist, the people of Oregon will be doing the right thing to elect him to that position and it will give us great pleasure, should he consent to run for that office, to give him our loyal support. The Eugene Register correctly says: "As one of the younger judges of the state he is one of the best judges of law in Oregon." That is also the reason why we believe he will make an excellent supreme court judge, and should fill the vacancy.

It was suggested that if a commercial club was started in this city, something should be done to provide a comfortable room for the women and children after they are through with their trading or waiting for their husbands. Some of the country towns provide rest rooms and comfortable quarters where people can eat their meals. It often happens that the women, especially those with young children, have to wait about in the streets or in the stores when it is wet and cold, having no other place to go. This is a matter which every business man might give a little consideration.

If Multnomah County had been "dry" the recent fatal "joy ride" would not have occurred in that county. It was gambling and lawless saloonkeepers which made Tillamook county go "dry." It looks to us that "joy rides" and road houses in Multnomah county will go a long way to create a strong sentiment against the saloons in that county and help greatly in making the state "dry" next year. The fatal "joy ride" proves one thing. The life of the young woman would have been spared had Multnomah

county been "dry." There are some "blind pigs" in some of the "dry" counties, but they are not doing the harm that the road houses are doing to young men and young women in Multnomah county.

Every now and then the respectable, law-abiding citizens are shocked and disgusted with the young rowdy element in this city who break into into premises and steal. It seems that it is going on again. We have often referred to these incidents, but the citizens are still being annoyed with the young lawless element. The trouble is not so much with the young thieves and the rowdies as it is with the silly sentimentalism which prevails whenever they are caught. Instead of keeping them from being punished, if it was insisted that they be punished the burglaries would soon stop. We have come to the conclusion that these affairs will never stop until a severe sentence is imposed upon them. And this will be the best lesson that could be given them, even if some of them have to go to the penitentiary. Let the strong arm of the law exert itself, and then, and not until then, will these burglaries and rowdism cease.

The Headlight is wanting to see a spirit of harmony and good will in the effort to build up and improve the city and county, and if there is to be any contention let it be to vie with each other as to who can do the most to bring about civic, industrial and commercial improvements. A good many silly things have been published about political bosses and political machines, but what we want now is a whole lot of bosses and a great big machine organization to help boost the city and county. In this effort to improve conditions, there will, no doubt, be many different opinions as to some matters, but with a spirit of give and take these difficulties should be overcome. With all factional and personal feelings laid aside, and with a long pull, and a strong pull, and a pull altogether, we believe that in the course of a comparatively few years Tillamook City will compare favorably with any of the progressive and up-to-date business cities in Oregon. The city made substantial improvements the past few months, and with a whole lot of boss boosters working harmoniously together, there is not the least doubt but what they will succeed.

Here is a good opportunity for the business interests of Tillamook City to show a solid front and make the needs of the city and county known. Congressman Hawley will be in the city on Saturday and Sunday, and every business man should make it a point to attend the banquet Saturday evening and accompany him to the bay on Sunday morning. Let's all get together, united and determined to leave no stone unturned to boost Tillamook and endeavor in every possible way to bring about harbor improvements. Tillamook City needs a 9-foot channel to the bay and harbor improvements. Mr. Hawley is coming over for the purpose of ascertaining our needs and conferring with the Port. We need government assistance in the improvement of Hoquartion slough, and if Mr. Hawley can bring about a mutual understanding between the government and the Port for each to bear part of the expense, Mr. Hawley's visit will be a great thing for this city. But it behooves every business and professional man to put their shoulder to the wheel, making Mr. Hawley's visit a success, as well as a splendid opportunity to get together in the common interest of the city.

The Anti Saloon Fight.

A fine congregation greeted Rev. J. R. Knodell, superintendent of the Oregon Anti-Saloon League, at the union meeting at the U. B. church last Sunday evening. Mr. Knodell's address was inspirational as well as educational. He reviewed the phenomenal gains along temperance lines throughout the country as a ground for encouragement and prospect, and pointed out the land yet to be possessed. He described the curse of the liquor traffic not only as a wrong but as a social disease and an economic blunder. Mr. Knodell, in concluding, outlined the plans of the league particularly with reference to the proposed amendments to be offered to the people at the next election, and which, if adopted will give Oregon a law for State wide prohibition in 1910.

Contributions to the work were made at the close of the meeting to the league in which Mr. Knodell has been a tireless worker for several years of splendid progress.

Ostrich Feathers of Tripoli.

The usual kinds of ostrich feathers known to the trade come into the Tripoli market. These are whites, blacks, feuillans, byocks, spadons, boos, drabs and floss. The Arab dealers bring them in unsorted packages containing feathers in various quantities of each kind, and it therefore requires expert knowledge to buy advantageously from the natives. The goods are sold by the "roti." (The Tripoli roti is about eighteen ounces.)

The feathers are washed and sorted, but not dyed or curled. They are washed in soapy water, and when still wet are beaten. A handful of them are taken by the stems and slapped against the floor with a force that to the uninitiated would seem to be enough to break them to pieces. This is done to bring out the hues or barboles, the miniature feathers extending from the barbs, and gives the plumes a fluffier, richer appearance. A good ostrich plume will have two or three layers of feathers; its tip should be perfect, and it should have no transverse cuts along the vane. For the retail trade two plumes are usually mounted together.

Burke as a Bore.

The most eloquent essay carefully prepared beforehand and delivered by one waiting the orator's gifts may as a speech be an utter failure. Burke is perhaps the most striking example of this. He simply drove everybody away. This is well and amusingly described by Lord Erskine to the American ambassador, Mr. Rush, who had asked him about Burke's delivery. "It was execrable," said he. "I was in the house of commons when he made his great speech on American conciliation, the greatest he ever made. He drove everybody away. I wanted to go out with the rest, but was near him and afraid to get up. So I squeezed myself down and crawled under the benches like a dog until I got to the door without his seeing me, rejoicing in my escape. Next day I went to the Isle of Wight. When the speech followed me there, I read it over and over again. I could hardly think of anything else. I carried it with me and thumbed it until it got like wadding for my gun."—Westminster Gazette.

Euphonious Female Names.

Her real name, when magnificently set forth, is "Alexandrina Victoria Andrewina," and the abbreviation is formed from the initial letters.—London Standard.
