HEMBREE MAY BE FREED.

McNary Fears Supreme Court Decision Will Cause Release.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 23.—When asked today concerning the final disposition of the Hembree murder case, District Attorney McNary stated he had just received a copy of the decision from the Clerk of the Supreme Court, but had not had time to read it carefully. He said if the newspapers have correctly reported the opinion of the court,

it may be that he will be compelled to dismiss the case.

"The Supreme Court appears to be of the opinion that the evidence was not sufficient to justify a conviction, and unless new evidence can be had by the time court meets in Polk County next December, another trial will be futile," said Mr. McNary.

The District Attorney will make a thorough examination of the opinion of the court, and will come to some definite conclusion in the near future.

Albert Maurer Kills Himself.

Albert Maurer committed suicide early on Wednesday morning by taking a dose of carbolic acid. He had been acting in a strange manner for several weeks and had an idea that he had no friends and that some men were going to kill him. Deceased lived with his wife and children on his place near the Red Clover factory, and after drying the cows into the barn about six o'clock on Wednesday morning he was missed, and a search being made for him, he was found dead two hours after in the hay loft. He had taken about two ounces of carbolic acid, and after doing so placed the bottle in his pocket. Maurer was a native of Sweden and about 40 years of age. He came to Tillamook county 18 years ago. Justice Sappington made an investigation as to the cause of death, and concluded that it was not necessary to hold an inquest.
