Editorial Snap Shots.

There is to be a tug of war between the Water Commission and the City Council. The battle royal is over the hydrant rent. It is not often that this neck of the woods is visited by a member of the national legislature, so it was noticed that Sheriff Crenshaw became busy on Sunday afternoon and hurried Congressman Hawley out of the city in his auto just before the stage left. Mr. Hawley took the joke good humoredly when released about six miles from the city, where he took the stage.

Tillamook City is getting some unsavory notoriety on account of exaggerated statements being published about a large amount of drunkenness in this city. We do not doubt there is some drunkenness going on in the city and county, but considering that so many railroad laborers have been coming and going for a long time, this is one reason why a few more drunken cases are to be seen. The exaggerated newspaper reports about drunkenness is a slur upon the city as well as upon the city officials.

From two view points. The late Mr. Harriman sent his chief of staff, Julius Kruttschnitt, to visit Tillamook county to ascertain whether the resources of the country would justify the expenditure of several millions of dollars to build the railroad into Tillamook upon prospective business, and after several days in speculation Mr. Kruttschnitt was more than satisfied that the great timber and other resources of the county would more than justify the expenditure. This was the opinion of a shrewd business man who was looking for prospective business.

Captain McIndoe was instructed to reconsider the project for the improvement of Tillamook bar, and he visited the county for that purpose. He was here but a few days, returning on the same steamer that he came in on, the result of which was he reported unfavorably because the present commerce does not justify the expenditure. Evidently Mr. Kruttschnitt and Captain McIndoe were looking through different goggles, the former for prospective business and the latter for only present commerce. Here we have a thoroughly practical far seeing business man and a man of theory. The latter has no conception of how the resources of the county are to be manufactured and marketed when the stereotyped and illogical report is made that the present commerce does not justify the commerce. Apply the same foolish argument to other matters, the present amount of fighting that is going on does not justify the expenditure of large sums of money to maintain a strong navy or army. If the government would aim to inject into the engineer's department a few men of Mr. Kruttschnitt's sagacity, the local engineers would be looking up the amount of prospective business that government improvements would bring about—not the present commerce, for Mr. Kruttschnitt would never have authorized the expenditure of several millions of dollars to build a railroad into Tillamook county had he taken the narrow view of the government engineers.

HAWLEY WILL ASSIST.

Pledges Support for Deeper Harbor for Tillamook.

M'INDOE SEVERELY SCORED

Business Men Honor Congressman Hawley with a Banquet.

Congressman W. C. Hawley, of the first congressional district, paid Tillamook county a visit last week. He came in on Friday evening over the Wilson river. Saturday morning he visited a number of the business men and was taken for a ride in James Walton's auto to inspect Gus Kuoze's fine band of Holstein cows. In the afternoon the Port of Tillamook took exclusive charge of Mr. Hawley, and with Captain Groat, who is in charge of the government work, Commissioners A. G. Beals, M. F. Leach and James Walton, went down to the bay in the government launch. During the run the commissioners pointed out the proposed improvement of Hoquartion slough as planned by the government engineers, and also pointed out the need of bar improvements. The congressman suggested several procedures which would have to be gone through before these projects could be sanctioned or carried out by the government, as there was no project under construction in Tillamook at the present time. Mr. Hawley told the Port that it was his intention of entering a vigorous protest to Captain McIndoe's adverse report as to the improvement of Tillamook bar.

McIndoe Severely Censured.

In the evening the business men gave a banquet in honor of Congressman Hawley's visit at the restaurant, when Host J. F. Ramsey served a most excellent supper and the music was furnished by Walter F. Baker, Chester McGee and Miss Ruby McGee. There was a large attendance of business men and every seat was occupied as there is considerable interest taken in harbor improvements. James Walton acted as toastmaster, and the other local speakers were Revs. Thos. Robinson and D. L. Shrode, Representative A. G. Beals, C. I. Clough, A. W. Severance and John O. Bozorth, of Bay City. Mr. Severance severely criticized Captain McIndoe for reporting adversely upon the project to improve Tillamook bar because the present commerce did not justify the expenditure, and he said that if that was the policy of the engineers' department Tillamook would remain bottled up and rot before the Government would assist. The speakers were of one accord in their opinion that the engineers should base their reports upon prospective commerce and not on the present commerce of the port. As an illustration of this the late Mr. Harriman sent Julius Kruttschnitt into Tillamook county, and as a result the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co. is expending several millions of dollars building a railroad for prospective business.

Hawley Pledges Support.

Congressman Hawley was warmly received when he rose to speak, and after commending the people of the county for the splendid improvements which were going on, said he was heartily in sympathy with the people in demanding these improvements, for the great timber resources of the county demand a waterway so that it may be transported to all parts of the world.

The Congressman was greatly disappointed in the adverse report of Captain McIndoe, and it was his intention to appeal and make a strong fight for the improvement of Tillamook bar and to get the Government to assist in the straightening and deepening of Hoquartion Slough.

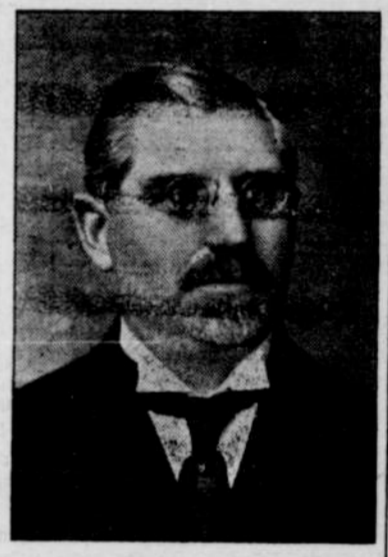

Annual Teachers' Institute.

The annual Teachers' Institute for Tillamook County convened on Wednesday morning in the high school building in this city, with a good attendance of teachers from all parts of the county, who are taking a good deal of interest in the institute work. County School Superintendent W. S. Buel, was fortunate in securing the services of Supt. R. F. Robinson, of Multnomah County, Prof. W. R. Rutherford, principal of the Tillamook High School, and Miss Maude Langhead as instructors. State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman arrived today and is taking part in the work. He will lecture this evening at the court house and all are invited to attend.

State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman is in Tillamook this week assisting Supt. Buel in his county institute. Mr. Ackerman is known as one of the best institute lecturers on the Pacific Coast, his talk, as like his work, always being from a practical and business like standpoint. During the time which he has served as the head of the educational system of the state laws have been passed that have brought Oregon's schools on a par with those of any other state in the Union.

Under Mr. Ackerman's administration about two hundred high schools have been organized throughout the state, the number of four year high schools has increased from five to more than fifty; the average daily attendance has reached 94 per cent of the enrollment; the character of the school buildings has been greatly improved, the school year has been lengthened from a minimum of three months to a minimum of six months each year, and a splendid

system of school government has been built up, with all the educational forces of the state working in harmony for the upbuilding of the schools.

Some of the laws which have proved of most practical benefit to the schools are the compulsory attendance law, the providing for a uniform course of study and uniform eighth grade examinations, the library law, giving each rural school in the state a good library at the lowest possible cost, the law requiring that each school district must have at least six months of school each year, and the law providing for an annual convention of school officers.

Mr. Ackerman is now making his annual tour of the county institutes, and in the next two months will visit practically every county of the state. This has been his custom every year since he was first elected to his present position, and it is largely due to his persevering and untiring efforts that the schools of the state have made such rapid progress in the past ten years.

Dr. Cook has begun reaping a harvest while Commander Peary is sending word from the North that Cook never planted a seed. Peary's charges have placed him in a position where he will be sadly discredited if he fails to substantiate them. The unwisdom of using the shorter and uglier words was never more clearly shown than in the attitude in which Peary has now placed himself. Even his warmest friends and admirers must concede that, if he fails short of the fullest measure of proof of the serious charge he has made against Cook, he will be so badly discredited that, even from the sordid money point of view in the case, his prospects will be materially reduced. He has gone so far beyond the prima facie stage, in the force of his characterization, that he will be unable to suspend public judgment by any mere juggle of words or of acts. He will have to make good.
