for a judgment for \$100 for refusing to cancel the mortgage.

It has since been ascertained that Chris Nichols, the foreman on the railroad who skipped out after cashing over \$2,500 in checks belonging to the men, succeeded in getting away with more money than was at first thought, for he had entrusted to him several hundred dollars to deposit in the bank, which he failed to do. Sheriff Crenshaw was close on Nichols's trail while in Portland, but he had too much of a start, and it is thought that he left with another man with the intention of going to Europe.

Dr. S. M. Kirron, of Portland, returned on the steamer last week for the purpose of locating in this city. He has taken a suite of rooms in the concrete building for his offices. Dr. Kirron is a graduate of the State university, and took considerable interest in foot ball and other sports while attending the university at Eugene, and received a certificate from the State Medical College. He comes to Tillamook highly recommended and with the intention of remaining here and building up a practice.

A. L. Arstell, the young man who gained such a notoriety in this county by forging checks and breaking out of the county jail, and who was sent to the penitentiary for the forgery, has gone to the penitentiary again for holding up Grocer McDonald on the Liberty road south of Salem after he was liberated from the penitentiary. He was later captured by Sheriff Minto and Deputy Esch in a grain field near Independence after an exciting chase. Judge Burnett sentenced him to one to ten years in the penitentiary.

OPTION LAW IS UPHELD. SUPREME COURT FINDS NO FLAW IN STATUTE.

Conviction of Tillamook Offender Is Affirmed and Initiative Act Is Found Valid.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 26.—In an opinion written by Justice King, the Supreme Court today affirmed the decision in the Circuit Court for Tillamook County in the case of the State vs. W. Langworthy. In this action the validity of the local-option law was brought into direct question, and by upholding the trial court the Supreme Court declares the local option law to have been legally enacted.

Langworthy was convicted of a violation of the local-option act and fined. The appeal was taken on the sole point that the trial judge refused to instruct the jury that the evidence established the fact that the correct title of the act had not been certified to by the County Clerks prior to the election of June, 1904, and that therefore the act was invalid and the defendant should be found not guilty.

The Appellate Court holds that "the right of the people to legislate directly—other than by adopting constitutional provisions—in place of relying solely on their representatives, was by them secured or reserved through the Initiative and referendum amendments to the constitution." Therefore, "if the act adopted in 1903 for the purpose of facilitating operations under the initiative amendment is not in conflict or inconsistent with such amendment, it must follow that the law is valid, and that any proceedings had in conformity therewith are ample."

In conclusion the court states that "a careful examination of the bill of exceptions discloses the fact that the local option law was submitted to the voters of the state in strict conformity with the mandates of the constitution, as amended, and as supplemental thereto and in aid thereof, and having received a majority of the votes cast at the general election at which it was submitted, accordingly became a law of the state."

There were two cases in the April term of the Circuit Court in which Langworthy was charged with violating

the local option law. In one case he was fined \$500 and one day in jail, but Judge Galloway reduced the fine later to \$300, which was paid. In the above case, appealed from the Circuit Court, it was an appeal from the Justice Court, where Langworthy was fined \$100 and 15 days in jail, but the justice remitted the jail sentence, and it was in this case where the law was attacked.

Howard Edmunds must Pay Fine for Bootlegging.

The supreme court handed down a decision also in the case of the State vs. Howard Edmunds, who was convicted in Tillamook co. of violating the local option law, which was decided in favor of the State. The opinion was written by Justice King. Edmunds was fined \$500 and 20 days in jail by Judge Galloway at the April term of court, but the jail sentence was suspended during good behavior.
