The constitution also sets forth, "Each House shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members." The "he" in the provision first quoted would seem to be fatal to the chances for the admission of any woman as a member of the House of Representatives. And the other stipulation gives the House the power to say whether it shall make "he" a generic pronoun to cover persons of both sexes. If the House holds that "he" and "she" are, as regards qualifications for voting and holding office, interchangeable terms it will let women in.
