DEATH TO CURE HIS GRIEF.

Young Tillamook Soldier Tries To Commit Suicide.

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 21.—Grief over the death of his father several years ago caused John W. Kays, aged 20, who enlisted in the regular army three months ago, to attempt suicide. He was found unconscious in his room with his face buried in a basin containing chloroform. He was revived and will recover, but says he will kill himself. He had written to his mother, Mrs. Lillian K. Harris, at Tillamook, Or., as follows: "I have brought more trouble to your heart, but I do not want you to grieve over what I have done. I want to be buried by my father's side. I have never enjoyed one moment of happiness since I learned of father's death."

Word was received in this city Thursday night of the attempt of young Kays to commit suicide. It seems that he had made several attempts to join the army, but had been rejected every time by the medical officers examining him, until he succeeded in enlisting recently in Denver, and even then he had to get a permit from his mother and father-in-law, as he was under age. He left here some time in the spring of the year, and since then has been writing cheerful letters to his mother, and on that account the attempt to take his life came as a great surprise. The young man was 20 years of age and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Kays, and his father was killed in a small saw mill at Sandlake about seven years ago, the remains being buried in the Oddfellows' cemetery, and later Mrs. Kays married Jeff Harris. There was a little trouble between Kays and his father-in-law previous to his leaving Tillamook, as the young man had been a little wild and had been drinking, but which was not serious enough to cause him to make an attempt upon his own life.

Port for Nehalem.

The Italians Brought Back.

Sheriff Crenshaw returned with five Italian prisoners from Portland and Astoria on the steamer Sue H. Elmore on Sunday. They were the Italians who "skidooed" after purchasing a number of articles from the Bay City merchants, leaving their bills unpaid. The sheriff of Clatsop county was notified and he arrested three men on the arrival of the steamer at Astoria. When Sheriff Crenshaw arrived there he found that out of the three men arrested only one was implicated in the affair. The other two, who were carrying concealed fire arms, were taken before the justice and fined \$10 each and then told to leave town. Sheriff Crenshaw went to Portland and succeeded in arresting the other four men and brought them back to the city. Their names are Frank Avolio, Nick Falcivete, Jos. Colese, Frontunete Zol-lorno and Angelo Salerna. The men were given a hearing before Justice Sappington on Wednesday, and taking the case under advisement, he bound them over this morning to the grand jury, after dismissing a motion by the men's attorneys to dismiss the case.

The fellow who says the government is going to pay the rent for a printing plant lacks business sense and is also lacking in common sense.

Apropos to the removal of the post office, we remember quite distinctly how surprised the patrons of the office were one morning when the post office suddenly, in the still small hours of the night, took flight from Main street to Second Avenue East. My, how the rascals did work that night and what a lot of cursing they did get next morning. It was truly amusing.

Wonder where Langworthy is? Peradventure he may be running a "blind pig" elsewhere, peradventure he may be sick, peradventure he may be employing a bevy of attorneys to bulldoze a circuit judge, or peradventure the attorneys made such a drunken muss endeavoring to bulldoze the court that even a boot legger of Langworthy's notoriety became disgusted and decided to take a long journey into a far country.

There is a good deal of truth in the remark made in New York which, is in the throes of a hot city election:

"America's one conspicuous failure is in its cities; their misgovernment is her reproach, a scandal to our civilization and all the world will be poorer if the genius of the American people, the good, kind, brave people who are Americans, does not wrest the government of the citizens from the bandits who at once plunder, disbauch and disgrace them."

Well, it is too bad, that the glory and the honor of defeating the local option law is not going to fall upon the Tillamook attorneys—to do the shouting. A number of attorneys, who took up the cause of the bootleggers, have found out that in trying to make the local option law unpopular they have also become unpopular themselves and lost business as well.

The snap shot man is not perturbed as to what remarks anyone may make because we raised the question whether the rock at the Red Clover factory was suitable for road purposes. No one should take exceptions to what we said. We strictly adhere to it that there should be no doubt whatever as to whether the rock is suitable for road purposes before it is used, for it would be a willful waste of public money to use it if it is not suitable. That is our contention and is made in the interest of good roads.

Some of the rock at the Red Clover factory, where the new crusher is located, was, we understand, sent to Portland to be analyzed and to ascertain whether it is suitable for road building. Quite a number of persons, some of whom are competent to pass an opinion, say that it is not suitable. There are those who think different, who contend that as it is a hard matter to drill into the rock, and which is making it become quite expensive, that it is suitable, but, as far as we are able to ascertain the opinion is becoming quite general that the county will have to look elsewhere for good rock.

The matter of moving the post office is a cold blooded business proposition with the government. A safe and commodious building for the mail and the public are two essentials which are first sought, and the concrete building having these it is not to be wondered at that the government made the change. On the other hand it was business enterprise in building the concrete building which brought about the change, for all must admit that mail is much safer in a concrete building than in a frame structure. Another thing, it is right and proper that the post office should be located in one of the best buildings in this growing and progressive city. It was open to anyone for years to erect a building of this character suitable for the post office in any part of the business portion of the city, and all must admit that those who were public spirited and enterprising to do so have, like the early bird, caught the worm.

The muddy, slushy condition of the roads, after the first spell of wet weather, again conclusively proves that thousands of dollars are wasted every year upon material for road building which is not suitable for that purpose. The material will not stand the heavy travel which it is subjected to, and the first wet spell demonstrates without the shadow of a doubt that it is the material, with poor drainage and ruts, which is at fault. This applies to the county as well as the city. For an illustration take the two business streets of Tillamook City, and for a number of years large sums of money have been thrown away upon gravel, or to be more correct, upon what is a poor substitute for gravel, and the only conclusion that one can come to is that the so-called gravel is hauled onto the roads and in a few weeks it is in slush and mud, pulverized to such a condition and ready to be hauled off, with the result that the business streets of the city remain in a deplorable condition every year. The roads in the county and city are subjected to much heavier travel than formerly, and if they will not stand up under the increased wear and tear, then it is proper to look for the cause of this expensive and unsatisfactory system of road building.

the beach resorts in Tillamook county, and to point out where they can not only make the resorts famous, but would be a money maker as well. That is the erection of an aquarium with a large number of tanks with different species of fish and craw fish in them. It would be a splendid attraction for any of the beaches in this county and would be a bonanza to those who would put money into an aquarium large enough to accommodate several thousand persons. The aquarium at Brighton, England, a fashionable summer resort, made that place famous, for excursion trains are run from all parts of that country to visit the aquarium. The snap shot man remembers visiting the aquarium at Westminster, in London, some years ago, and besides the numerous tanks with different kind of fish, was a large open tank fitted up with rock and railed in with a iron railing, which contained a dozen large sea lion, and the noise they made about feeding time in the closed in building was terrific, but it amused the crowds of people. Probably the best way to describe the Brighton aquarium is this: Imagine yourself walking down a dark covered street and on either side large plate glass tanks 50 feet long and 12 feet high, with different specie of fish in each tank, the light from above the tank giving a clear view into the tank. It seems to us, that with so many varieties of fish in the Pacific ocean a splendid assortment is available to make a splendid showing. Once erected, an aquarium is an inexpensive affair to keep up. There are a great many money making opportunities in Tillamook county, and this is one. Bay City, Bayocan Park, Netarts or Gary baldi beaches, in fact, anywhere along the Tillamook coast would be a suitable place for an aquarium. A large number of fair shows butt in wherever there is liable to be a crowd, but an aquarium, gotten up in good style, would be a great drawing card for Tillamook and a great money maker as well.
