dant of "dope."

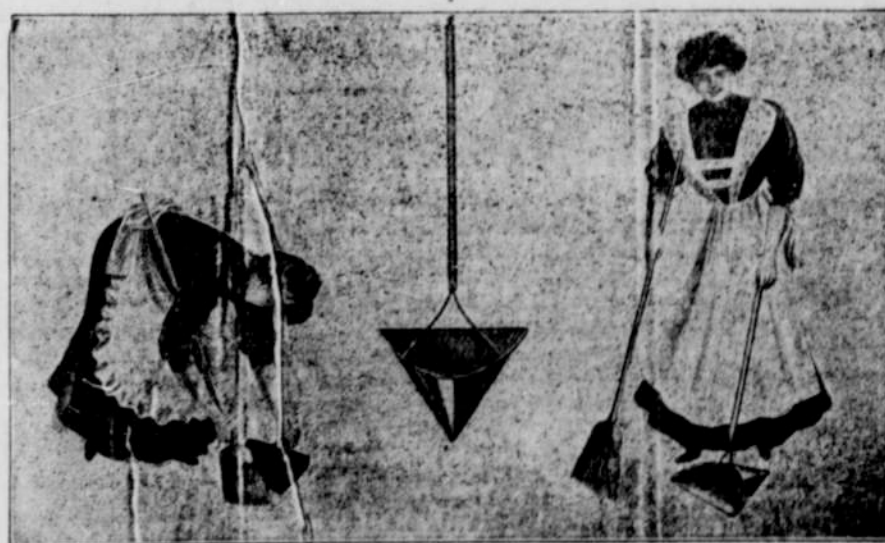
Fred Christenson was the lucky man
