## Tillamook Jottings.

The snap shot man has been so busy  
with job work he had no time this week  
to devote to that department, and with  
the business men loading him down with  
large advertisements at a late hour the  
Headlight staff has been kept on the  
jump.

In the case filed last week by Hiram  
Eadus and wife against Sheriff H. Cren-  
shaw, N. E. Melchior and Glenn H. John-  
son, who were sued for damages in con-  
nection with the attachment proceedings  
of the launch Frolic, a motion was filed  
by the plaintiff's attorney to dismiss the  
case.

The County Court let a contract yester-  
day to Walter Wood to construct two  
miles of the Netarts road, the bid being  
\$3,472. Two other bids were put in,  
one from Hicks & Riefenberg for \$4,472;  
and the other from Hodgdon Bros. for  
\$1,975 for the first mile and \$2,450 for  
the second mile.

We have always thought that Judge  
Galloway showed a too lenient spirit in  
reducing Langworthy's fine. He fined  
the notorious bootlegger \$500 and then  
reduced it to \$300, after the attorney's  
put up a pitiful plea about Langworthy  
going to be good—well, they all say that  
when they get caught.

The county court met on Tuesday to  
canvass the votes cast at the election to  
create a Port of Nehalem. The count  
was: Foley, 2 for and 25 against; Ne-  
halem, 76 for and 27 against, giving a  
majority of 36. Governor Benson will  
appoint the first commission after being  
notified of the result of the election.

The steamer Argo managed to cross  
on Sunday after being held bound for  
several days. As the weather was bad  
and stormy when she crossed out there  
was some anxiety, for it was reported  
on Tuesday that she had not arrived at  
Astoria. This did not prove correct, for  
the Argo went right through to Port-  
land.

Mrs. W. M. Heaston, assisted by her  
sister, Mrs. F. E. Norton, entertained the

last at her home in the eastern part of

Pacific City, Ore.; Mr. and Mrs. G. L.  
Dick and Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Noyes, of  
Tillamook; Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Norton,  
of Woods, Ore.

The Tillamook Lumber Mfg. Co. is  
erecting a new warehouse on the east of  
the present one, which will be used for all  
kinds of finished lumber. The saw mill  
is greatly handicapped at the present  
time to store dressed lumber, but with a  
few days of dry weather the new ware-  
house will be covered in, when the com-  
pany will stock up with a large assort-  
ment of dressed lumber, mouldings and  
dry cheese boxes.

State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman,  
we are reliably informed, has decided to  
be a candidate for governor. He will be  
a strong candidate, for the State Super-  
intendent has a good clean record and is  
popular all over the State. He has  
proved himself to be a live, progressive  
official and as he is conversant with the  
needs and requirements of Oregon, he  
would make an excellent governor.

The Hotel Columbia, Vancouver, Wash.,  
has changed hands. Mrs. Srethna S.  
Phelps, of Portland, and formerly of Ne-  
tarts, having bought the property, the  
consideration being \$75,000. This is a  
good piece of property and contains a  
lot 100 by 110 feet. The building is 100  
by 100 feet, with four stories and brick  
basement, steam heated, electric lighted,  
fine baths and sample rooms, buffet  
and restaurant in connection. Mrs. Phelps  
is the manager, and anyone stopping at  
this hostelry will be treated with every  
consideration due the traveling public.  
Mrs. Phelps is still a booster for Oregon.

As Justice Sappington did not think  
that the evidence was sufficient to hold  
the five Italians, who were arrested in  
Astoria and Portland, charged with  
cheating Bay City merchants, he ordered  
one of them to be discharged. In anti-  
pation of this Deputy District Attorney  
Cooper had papers ready to be served  
upon them, upon complaint of Nelson  
Bros., of Bay City, charging them with

obtaining goods under false pretences,  
whereupon Sheriff Crenshaw immediately  
placed the man under arrest. The men  
were given a hearing on Monday on the  
second charge and the justice bound them  
over to the grand jury.

P. W. Todd has sold his stock of goods  
in the Tyler building to C. B. Vantress,  
who will clear out all old stock at great-  
ly reduced prices and start up in men's  
furnishings, shoes and hats.

Miss Neomi Svenson, daughter of  
Mr. Chas. Svenson, died suddenly in  
Portland. She was stopping at Mr.  
Anderson's, and Friday evening went  
to a party with some friends. She did  
not make her appearance on Saturday  
morning at the usual hour, and as it  
was thought she was tired they allowed her  
to rest, but later those in the house be-  
came anxious about her, and going to  
her room were greatly shocked and sur-  
prised to find that she was dead. Mr.  
Svenson was advised of his daughter's  
death and he left on Saturday to bring  
the remains to Tillamook for burial. She  
was 17 years of age and it is thought  
that heart failure was the cause of  
death.

with no likelihood that Old Sol would  
smile on the brides on their wedding  
day. The happy couples are industrious  
young people and our hope is that both  
marriages will prove a blessing through-  
out life to them, even if they did get  
married while a Tillamook rain storm  
was raging.

OPEN NEW LOGGING CAMP  
IN TILLAMOOK.Eastern Operators Will Develop  
Big Holdings Along New  
Railroad.

A new logging camp of large ca-  
pacity is assured on the Lytle railway  
in Tillamook County, sometime during  
the coming Summer. It will be op-  
erated by a band of Michigan timbermen,  
who have just come to Oregon to locate  
and enter into the Oregon industry,  
which is soon destined to rank with the  
greatest state source of wealth. H. L.  
Cox had charge of the plans that re-  
sulted in the removal to this city of  
23 Cheboygan, Mich., citizens, and is  
one of the heaviest investors in the new  
Oregon enterprise. It is stated on good  
authority that the group now own  
about 300,000,000 feet of timber in Till-  
amook, so situated that it can be reached  
by a branch line tapping the Lytle rail-  
way. Completion of this new Till-  
amook line from Hillsboro to the ocean  
which will occur some time the coming  
Summer, gives the country its first out-  
let, and the work of the Cheboygan  
people will be among the first impor-  
tant plants opened in the new territory.

Tillamook and the interior of Clatsop  
and Columbia have some of the finest  
fir that is to be found in the "for-  
est," which means that here is some of  
the finest timber of the world. Al-  
though logging operations have been in the  
past confined to navigable waters, or  
railway lines of a few miles length,  
terminating upon such waters, the  
first important step into the interior  
will be made, pioneering the way for  
class of logging and lumber manu-  
facture that will in the near future  
prove the dominant line of the work in  
the state.
