The county's blind pig pen has been vacant too long, and the time is long past when a whole band of the blind pigs were nosing around in the county's sty.

Bootlegger Langworthy returned to the city, and it seems if those who were backing him and promised to pay his fine goes back on him he will "sweat" it out in the county's blind pig pen.

We have all heard about "stool pigeons." In Tillamook City they have reached a much higher degree of civilization, for it is plain as the snouts on their faces that we have a lot of "stool pigs" in it is city.

There is a good deal of truth in the old saying: "Be sure your sin will find you out." Bootleggers in this county have been doing a tremendous amount of sinning, but it will eventually bring them before the bar of justice.

Eggs are selling at 50c. a dozen in Tillamook City and there is not enough to supply the demand even at that price. This is a good thing for the producers, but, oh my, the poor consumers are wondering how much higher eatables will go.

Unless someone consents to be Uncle Sam's stamp licker at Dolph, the post office at that place will be discontinued. Here's a chance for office seekers, and they won't have to subscribe to statement No. 1, nor any other fool statement, either.

Some people talk about controlling saloon in advocacy of a wet county. We will ask a simple question. As it appears to be a difficult matter in Tillamook City to make the near-beer joints comply with the law, how much more difficult is it to make a saloon keeper to respect by the law?

There are quite a number yet who have not, but should be, caught in the blind pig muck rake. As the real fun has only just begun there will be something doing from now on, for the "squealers" are becoming more numerous.

It is pretty bad form for young women to be smoking cigarettes on the streets with young men. Perhaps if parents kept a closer tab on their daughters there would not be as many young girls starting a life of prostitution through getting into bad habits and bad company.

Wonder whether he could tell what breed of blind pigs they belonged to: Tillamook City's curly tailed blind pigs, Nehalem's flopped eared blind pigs, Garibaldi's mud wallowing blind pigs, Bay City's long legged blind pigs or Cloverdale's barn raised blind pigs. It is a pity there is not a stock show in this county so that these different breeds of blind pigs could be put on exhibition.

so much so, he thought that it was a good thing for his health to leave the city, for he did not have the nerve to witness such a slaughter. We will be caught and brought back and lined up with the other Tillamook law breakers who are the cause of the drunkenness and so many boys getting booze.

The spirit of lawlessness in this county is again plainly seen in the bootleg cases. It is unfortunate for Tillamook County that the conditions are such, for it still gives the county a bad reputation. The Headlight has long since come to the conclusion that before this will be put a stop to the officials will have to send a number of them to the county jail or state penitentiary. That would have a most wholesome effect as well as economical for the county, for the silly, sentimental habit of sympathizing with the lawless class does not help to reduce taxation.

Those who "knocked" because the county court decided to build a bridge across the Tillamook river argued that it was a waste of money to do so because of the bad condition of the road to Netarts. Well, it seems that the bridge is nearly complete and the first two miles of the road is to be put in good shape. We will add this, that no other part of the county is knocking because the county court is building bridges. No matter, the people from the center part of the county will be able to go to Netarts in ease and comfort next summer, something they have longed to do for many years past.

Justice in Tillamook County is a queer thing, or, at least, it takes a peculiar turn every once in a while. For instance: Solon Schiffmann was accused of keeping his cheese factory in an unsanitary condition. He was given a trial in Justice Sappington's court and the jury failed to agree, as two of the jurymen, it is reported, voted blank. Then Schiffmann voluntarily pleaded that he was guilty and the justice fined him \$25. The costs in the case, as will be seen in the board of commissioner's proceedings, amounted to \$74.05, and "the people," whom we hear so much about, have to pay the costs, for the fine goes to the state.

Does Mayor Coates and the City Council need further proof that the near-beer joints, whom they licensed to sell that delectable, have been the cause of some of the drunkenness in the city. There is only one course for them to pursue, that is if they are looking after the city's and not the interests of the law breakers, is to revoke the licenses and call upon the bondsmen to pay into the city the amount of their bonds. And, another thing, as the near-beer joints have now proved themselves to be blind pig joints, the City Council should grant no more near-beer licenses, for they have proved themselves a regular snare and delusion.

If you are a knocker and see the shadows of failure in everything that is proposed to help the town, for heaven's sake go get into some secluded canyon and kick your shadow on the clay bank, and give the men who are working to build up the town a chance. In the case of Morris Schnal vs. The Portland & Tillamook Transportation Co., in which the plaintiff sued for \$400.75 for alleged damages to goods, the jury assessed the damages at \$15, which throws the costs upon the plaintiff.
