### Editorial Snap Shots.

Now will the blind pigs be good? They had better.

Instead of holding a kangaroo court the bootleggers in jail can hold a "blind pig" court.

As a large proportion of the dairy-men voted for local option, it would not be a bad idea if they left a can or so of wry at the court house for the "blind pigs."

We were a little surprised that the grand jury did not bring in some indictments against gamblers, for the city appears to be getting into bad repute again from that evil.

The "bootleggers" have brought Tillamook City and County into bad repute, and now the "bootleggers" are getting into bad repute by getting "jail bird" attached to their names.

Instead of sending the boys to the penitentiary, it would be more sensible to send some of the parents of the bad boys there for not looking after and setting their children better examples.

It is pretty tough upon the "stool blind pigs" to be sent to jail for the sins of their employers. Well, the employers have the horse laugh on the "stool pigs" who are carolled in the county's blind pig pen.

Notice to bootleggers! It would not surprise us much that the next batch of bootleggers who are haled before the circuit court will get 30 days in jail and \$500 fine on every indictment. Stick this in your hat and see whether this does not come true.

It is pretty humiliating for the bootleggers to be cast into jail with a Dago and to occupy the same cell that murderers Hembree and Nordstrom and bank check forger Arstille were incarcerated in. No wonder that some of them fell humiliated and cross-fallen.

The "bootleggers" were determined that the people should not rule in Tillamook. What a fool thing to do. The people are beginning to rule, however, and a big batch of those who opposed the people's will are where they belong—in jail, and with a sense of satisfaction all over the county that the people have won a decisive victory over the "bootleggers" and the whiskey element.

See if this does not come true. The "bootleggers" and "jail birds" will be out in time to help pack the city caucus for the purpose of nominating a city ticket composed of those who are in sympathy with the violators of the law. It is a time that the business men got together and put a stop to the bad odor that hangs over the city on account of this and other lawlessness that is going on.

There was something wrong somewhere, for on Monday and Tuesday a large number of students were absent from the public school and were in the court room listening to the evidence in the Catterlin case. In school was the proper place for the pupils and parents who permitted this sort of looking after their children's best interest in allowing it. The truant officer should have been advised, for no legitimate excuse could be given by the pupils for absenting themselves from the public school.

It is really unfortunate that a good business section of the city, such as Main street, should have the reputation of being called "Blind Pig Street," and it is also unfortunate for the business men who conduct respectable business houses on that street to have to put up with such a lawless lot of neighbors, and with the city authorities doing nothing to put a stop to the bad reputation that street has fallen into. But facts prove the assertion, for in a radius of two blocks blind pig corners are unusually numerous.

For the information of Mayor Coates and the City Council, evidence was given in the circuit court that Clyde Clements sold whiskey over the bar in his near beer and pool room and that two bar tenders in Stephen's near beer and pool room went to a side room and sold beer. Now what action will the Mayor and City Council take to close up these places? They have violated the confidence the city authorities placed in them when they granted them licenses. Let's see whether the city dads will wink at this violation of law or will they handle the matter in a business manner and make the near beer and pool rooms pay the penalty by revoking their licenses? That is the proper thing to do, so as to punish these and warn others that this state of affairs cannot be continued.

Numerous complaints are made about the bad behavior and immoral conduct of some of the young people of this city. We are sorry to say that the complaints are well founded. But we are not going to censure the young people as much as the older ones and their parents. It is the bad example set them by a number of business men and even their own parents. Parents who are raising children, and especially boys, have no business loitering away their time in the pool rooms and near beer joints, where card playing, gambling, swearing and lawlessness is carried on. This is a bad example to set boys. And from the reckless manner in which some of the boys and young men are carrying on, someone's boy will have to be sent to the penitentiary as a warning and example to other boys and young men. The public will not stand it any longer. Now who's boy will be sent to the penitentiary?

Tillamook City and County is only reaping what it sowed. Years ago saloons were kept under control. Then came an era of wide open gambling, debauchery and lawless-
