Governor Benson has announced the appointment of the following commissioners of the new port of Nehalem: C. H. Wheeler, Henry Tohl, H. V. Alley, F. A. Rowe, Frank Zaddach. The port has just been incorporated under the terms of an act passed at the last session of the Legislature.

Governor Benson has appointed James Walton as one of the delegates from Oregon to the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, which is to be held in Washington, D.C., on December 8th, 9th and 10th. B. L. Eddy, of Roseburg, and formerly of Tillamook, is also one of the delegation.

The steamer Sue H. Elmore came in on Saturday with a number of passengers and left here on Sunday with the following passengers: Miss Bramwell, C. Hannenkrat, M. R. Robins, R. M. Buckle, J. Coulber, Alex. Poksa, Capt. B. Tobell and Miss Zumstein. As a heavy rain and wind storm was blowing she was unable to cross out.

The steamer Argo reached this city Saturday evening, and working her cargo that night, she left early Sunday morning, and succeeded in crossing out. Her passengers from here were Ed. Faulkner, John Starr, John Norboy, L. G. Freeman, wife and daughters. She was fortunate in getting out, as another southwest storm came up that evening.

At a meeting of the City Council on Thursday evening, a franchise was granted the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co. to lay a track on Water street, the railroad company to use the north side of the street. The city council instructed the recorder to obtain from the water commission its annual report. The city caucus, to nominate a city ticket, was set for Saturday evening.

The Ladies' Aid of the Church of Christ met with Mrs. Hall, November 8th, and will meet on the 25th, at the parsonage. Next week they will meet with Mrs. Margaret Holden. It is desired that all the members be present. The bazaar will be held Friday and Saturday, December 3rd and 4th, in Jones-Knudson Co.'s concrete building. Many dainty and useful things for Christmas gifts will be on sale. Sermon subjects of the Church of Christ next Lord's day: a.m., "Christ's Estimate of Happiness;" p.m., "The House Which God Built."

From Astoria comes word that the proposed Astoria-Seaside-Tillamook electric railroad has been financed and that work will begin

immediately. This will be good news to the thousands of Summer visitors who throng the beach resorts south of the Columbia River. A frequent service, which can best be supplied by an electric line, will not only attract newcomers to these beach resorts, but it will greatly add to the pleasure and convenience of the "regulars," who for years have spent the Summer at the beach. The line, by following almost any of the routes on which surveys have been made between Seaside and Tillamook, would present scenic attractions of surpassing interest.—Oregonian.

An agreement has been filed with the County Clerk between N. N. Brooten and John A. Anderson and T. H. Faulconer, in which it is agreed to sell the ore from what is known as the Brooten mineral property, in the south part of the county. The ore is to be known as the "Brooten's Kelp Ore," and the parties agree to take not less than \$500 worth of ore during the first year; \$1,000 the second year; \$1,500 for the third year, delivered at the mine and to be sold in the State of California or the territory of Arizona, upon the following terms: For antiphlogestine, containing medical properties for poultices, at \$200 per ton; ore containing medical properties for mud and steam baths, \$125 per ton; for ore containing medical properties for water baths, \$75 per ton; for ore containing medical properties for drinking water, \$300 per ton. The ore is to be treated by Brooten before delivery suitable for the purposes expressed in the agreement, and the contract is for 20 years, with the privilege to take more ore when desired.

THE PORT MEETS.

Harbor Line Established—Squatters Must Move Off the Water Front.

The Port of Tillamook held a meeting on Friday evening, when H. T. Botta, president, M. F. Leach, Dave Fitzpatrick and James Walton were present. The port took the first step towards the improvement of the water front and the straightening of Hoquarnton slough. Secretary Walton read a communication from the engineer's department in regard to a project for the improvement of the slough, which caused a good deal of discussion, and the secretary was instructed to write the department again as to plans, etc. Mr. Walton announced that he had been appointed by the governor a delegate to the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, and suggested that Mr. Russell Hawkins take his place, so that Tillamook could be represented. This was left over to see whether Mr. Hawkins would consent to go to Washington. The question of the establishment of a harbor line was then taken up and it was unanimously adopted that the north line of the Thomas donation claim be declared the harbor line, and the secretary was authorized to write the engineers department to that effect, and to order those who had encroached upon the slough to move back to the line, which will necessitate the removal of docks, wharfs and buildings on the south side of the slough. The Port took up the matter of refunding the tax money levied by the old Port, but as it would only necessitate levying that much more tax when the next levy is made, it was thought that nothing would be gained by doing so. The members of the Port appeared to be unanimously of the opinion that they should proceed forthwith by making all necessary arrangements to get the preliminary work as to the straightening of the slough under weigh as soon as possible, and when this is done, let the work by contract. Several other minor matters came up and the Port adjourned to meet at the call of the secretary.
