Most of the business men deplore the loss of freight on the ill-fated steamer Argo. Alex. McNair is probably the largest loser, with about \$2500, which is partly covered by insurance. Amongst his freight was 400 cases of coal oil. A safe for the post office was lost and about nine or ten tons of iron for the bridge on the Tillamook river. In all, the Argo had 170 tons of freight when she was wrecked.

### MRS. HOLDREDGE'S BODY IS EXHUMED.

**Foolish, Senseless Persons Created an Agitation that Woman was not Dead.**  
 Because the body of Mrs. Catherine Holdredge had a life-like appearance when it was brought to this city for burial, and notwithstanding that Coroner Hawk had held an inquest and the body had been buried Tuesday afternoon, an agitation was started that evening that Mrs. Holdredge was not dead and that she had been buried alive. Men gathered on the streets and believed the foolish ideas of one and the other that they became quite excited and worked up, so much so that they went to Mr. Holdredge and obtained permission from him to have the body exhumed. They then routed up Sheriff Crenshaw, who did not want anything to do with it, but as Mr. Holdredge had made the request that the sheriff should take charge, he consented to go along. The services of Drs. Boals and Smith were secured and two hacks started for the cemetery at 11.00 o'clock at night, when the body was exhumed. The doctors made two examinations of the body lasting about an hour and as they could find no trace of life the body was re-buried, the doctors declaring that she was dead.  
 The body of Mrs. Holdredge was found by two men searching on the beach about eleven o'clock at night, over six hours after the accident. Her body was nude, for what clothing she had on, a undershirt, kamono and coat, were over her head,

and only remained on the body on account of being buttoned round the neck. The body was perfectly rigid when found, and the clothing was over the woman's head. The body remained on the sand all that night, and Saturday it was taken to a cabin on the beach, and then brought to this city for burial. The weather was too stormy on Monday to bury the remains, so the funeral was put off until the next day.  
 It was a senseless agitation which caused the excitement, for people would not listen to common sense or reason, and in consequence the general opinion is that they did a most foolish thing in having the body exhumed.
