

**NEW BOAT SOUGHT**

**Owners of Lost Argo to Build Another Steamship.**

Franklin & Company, owners of the lost steamship Argo, are endeavoring to secure a vessel to take the place of the one lost off Tillamook bar last day. It is the intention of the company to charter a vessel until a craft can be built. Negotiations have been in progress for the chartering of a steamer, but up to a late hour last evening nothing definite had been settled on.

Rumor had it yesterday that negotiations were completed for the placing of the steamship on the Washington on the Tillamook run for the Portland and Tillamook Transportation Company. The Washington is owned by the Washington Marine Association of Seattle, and has been tied up in the lower harbor for more than two years. She is a craft of 365 tons burden and was built at Seattle in 1906. She is 159 feet long, 5.3 feet beam and 12.4 feet depth hold. For a time she plied in the regular service as a lumber pack between Portland and San Francisco. Later she jumped into notoriety as the slaying of the steamer, on a wild night in February of this year by a person supposed to be one Thorin. The Washington is now moored below the German moorings at Clatskanie.

L. T. Branstetter, president of the Tillamook Transportation Company, returned Sunday from California. He attended a meeting of the stockholders yesterday and it was decided not to abandon the run. The new vessel to be built for the run will be about the same size as the Argo, but will be built on modern lines and with modern equipment. She will be provided with passenger accommodations for at least 40 people. Oregonian.

**W. H. RICHARDSON DIED AT BIGGS.**

**Civil War Veteran Answers The Last Call**

BIGGS, (Butte Co.), Nov. 22—Warren Hale Richardson who died yesterday morning, after a protracted illness, at the age of 71 years, was a veteran of the Civil War and a member of Companies E and C of the Third Regiment, California Volunteer Infantry, having enlisted at Stockton, in May 1862. He was mustered out of the United States military service at Camp Douglas, Ariz., in May, 1865.

Mr. Richardson was a native of Corinth, Vt., and a resident of California for a number of years, returning to Vermont in 1873, but again returning to California in 1881, and located at Biggs in 1900. He was a resident here for the past nine years, making a host of friends who extend their sympathy to his widow and brother, John Burton Richardson, who survive him and who were with him at his passing away.

The funeral was held today from his late residence, the Rev. W. C. Oarriott, pastor of the M. E. Church, officiating. The following veterans of the Civil War, Frank F. Carnduff, Moses Lo Point and M. A. Randall, with J. M. Brough; C. E. Chatfield and N. B. La Point, friends of the family, were pall bearers. Interment was made in Live Oak Cemetery.

Mr. Richardson was a former resident of this city and left here about 9 years ago.
