

**STEAMER NEWPORT IS SOLD.**

Reported that Boat Will Go On Tillamook Run.

Application has been made at the office of the United States Inspector at San Francisco, for an inspection of the steamship Newport, now at Eureka, California. Report has it that the vessel has been purchased by A. Dunham and a company and will be placed on the run between Portland and Tillamook.

Dunham was formerly an owner in the steamship Argo, but about three months ago sold his interest in the vessel. The Argo was lost two weeks ago while trying to cross over the Tillamook bar. Franklin & Co., the managing owners of the Argo, assert they have not yet secured a vessel to take the place of the Argo.

**ADMINISTRATRIX WINS.**

J. H. Adkins Receives Telegram Regarding Settlement of Suit.

J. H. W. Adkins, of Gales Creek, while in the News office Tuesday on his way to Portland, said that he had received word from the administratrix in the case of the Sevier heirs against the government in the U. S. Court of Claims and that the case had been decided in favor of the administratrix and that the amount allowed was \$447,494.

The game started off like a whirlwind with a basket by Rhodes, closely followed by a nice long goal by Plasker, and by swift accurate passing on the part of the Outlaws Chapler managed to get the sphere in the cage for the third goal.

Rhodes then lost the little sense with which he was endowed and made two nice clean goals in less time than it takes to tell it, making the score 10-0 in favor of the Outlaws. **GASOLINE TANK EXPLODES.**

Two Persons Burned and C.O.D. Laundry Destroyed by Fire.

On Friday afternoon an explosion occurred in the gasoline tank at the C. O. D. Laundry, which is owned by Harry Sharp and J. Bolin. It seems that the pipe leading to the tank was not working right, which caused the gasoline to ignite, following which was a loud explosion, shattering the tank and throwing the burning oil in every direction and setting fire to most everything that it touched. Miss Cora Stubbs had a close call when her clothing was all in flames, when she was taken from the burning building. Her clothing was burned and she was severely burned on the back and she lost her hair. J. Bolin was also burned and had a narrow escape of being burned to death. The force of the explosion knocked him and Miss Stubbs to the floor, and they had a terrible experience with fire. Mr. Bolin was burned about the face and his hands were severely burned. Harry Sharp was at the furnace when the explosion occurred, and by the time he reached the laundry it was ablaze. Dr. Boals attended to Miss Stubbs' injuries and Dr. Kerron attended to Bolin.

A fire alarm was turned in by Dr. Reedy, who was standing near the city hall when he heard the explosion and saw the smoke. The hose company soon responded, but the fire spread so rapidly that the entire building was enveloped and a fierce fire was burning when the boys arrived. They first turned their efforts to saving Hiner's machine shop, and succeeding in that they soon had the fire in the laundry under control. The entire building was badly burned and most all of the laundered articles and washing were destroyed. There was \$1,000 of insurance on the building.

**DOG TWICE SAVED IS REFUGEE'S GIFT.**

Puppy "Argo" is Joy of Lightship Crew that Saved Master.

Saved from the waterlogged and sinking steamship Argo by seaman Woldhouse, cared for and nursed by the crew of the vessel in the tedious and perilous trip in a lifeboat from Tillamook Bay to the Columbia River lightship, rescued a second time from the lifeboat and then to be adopted by and signed on as a member of the lightship crew is the short story of a cocker spaniel puppy. This same puppy has been christened Argo and is now a pettable seaman on the lightship.

C. H. Higley, a passenger on the Argo, and the only one to leave the ship in the Captain's boat, was the owner of the puppy. In the excitement and scramble on board the lightship the little dog was lost sight of by all except Seaman Woldhouse. Argo was the only animal on board the vessel and on the voyage down the coast had made friends with the sailor. The dog was placed in the lifeboat and looked after until the arrival, at 4:30 o'clock in the morning, at the lightship.

Seas were running mountains high and to take the refugees on board the light vessel, it was necessary to pass a bowlin around the waist of each before he ventured on to the Jacob's ladder. In the mess little Argo was lost again. Two hours later Woldhouse remembered his charge and forthwith started a disturbance. A sailor on the lightship found the puppy swimming about in the flooded lifeboat. The dog was passed to the deck on a line and as soon as it was untied, it stretched and began to wag its stump of a tail.

Accommodations were limited on the lightship and it was necessary for members of the crew of the lost vessel to sleep on the deck of the saloon. Argo became playful and in a few hours after was nipping the ears and noses of the tired and sleeping sailors. The dog was the life and interest of the ship during the enforced stay on board. It became the idol of the lightship crew and they refused to let the puppy go ashore.

Mr. Higley, former owner of Argo signed away all right, title and interest in the dog to the crew of the lightship the consideration being a life.

"Boys you have saved my life and the only thing I have to offer in recompense is the dog. I know he will always have a home to be proud of," was the speech of Higley.
