The steamer Golden Gate made her first run to Tillamook last week on a five days schedule and left on Saturday. It was reported from Garibaldi that the steamer, while crossing out on Saturday, had gone on the spit and was in a worse predicament than the Argo when she stranded. The report proved to be untrue.

Hiram Eadus vs. The Tillamook County Bank, a corporation, and Glenn H. Johnson is a suit filed in the circuit court in which the plaintiff claims that he was deprived of the use of the launch Frolic by the unlawful acts of the defendants and was damaged in the sum of \$500 by reason thereof, and a half interest in the launch valued at \$200 makes the amount \$2,500 that is sued for.

Howard Edmunds, who applied for a rehearing of the local option case in the supreme court, was denied a rehearing. This was a case where Edmunds was convicted of bootlegging in the April term of the circuit court and Judge Galloway imposed a \$500 fine. The case was appealed to the supreme court and was decided against Edmunds and a motion for a rehearing was made.

At a meeting of the school district on Tuesday for the purpose of levying a tax to pay off some of the bonded indebtedness and for other purposes, it was decided to levy 9 mills. Last year the levy was 8 mills, but as the new school law favors the small schools, the apportionment of school funds for the large schools will be smaller. The enrollment this year amounts to 350, being an increase of 35 over last year.

Masses at Sacred Heart Church on January 1st will be low mass at 8.30 a.m. and High Mass at 11 a.m. The Holy Hour on December 31st will be from 8.30 p.m. to 9.30 p.m. instead of 8 p.m. to 9 p.m. as announced last Sunday.

Rosenberg Bros., who recently came to this city and invested in property, have rented from W. C. King, with an option to purchase, the building recently vacated by Jones & Knudson, and will open up shortly with a flour, feed and grocery store.

A. J. Hembree will ask Governor Benson for full pardon and for restoration of his rights as citizen. Although the charge against Hembree of murdering his wife has been dismissed, he is still under sentence for manslaughter, the verdict having been returned by a Tillamook County jury in the trial wherein he was charged with the murder of his daughter, Hembree served one year of an indeterminate sentence for manslaughter and was then paroled by Governor Chamberlain. He is now circulating a petition for his full pardon.—Dallas Observer.

The fire alarm at nine o'clock on Thursday evening called the Hose Company out to a fire which had originated in the kitchen of the Palace restaurant. The fire had taken a good hold at the rear end of the building and rapidly spread to the second story. There was a little delay in getting water on the fire owing to the hose being froze and the bursting of three sections, but as soon as they were removed it did not take long before the fire was extinguished. Chief Crenshaw was struck in the eye with the full force of water from one of the nozzles, causing a painful injury and bringing blood from the eye. Joe Illingsworth slipped while on the roof and received a severe shaking, tearing open the flesh on his left hand. Both had to be doctored for their injuries. While fighting fire quite a number of the boys were wet thro-

ugh, and as it was a cold night, it made it unpleasant for them. The restaurant was closed for a couple of days owing to the fire.

Deputy Sheriff John Aschim left on Sunday for Portland, where A. C. McKeen is under arrest and is wanted in this county. McKeen came here and claimed that he represented the Owls and gathered in over \$600 entrance fees from persons he had intuced to join. McKeen "skidooed" and went to California, and was brought back to Portland on a charge of obtaining money on a check on his brother-in-law. As the latter told the grand jury that he would have paid it had it been presented to him, McKeen was turned loose, only to be re-arrested on a warrant sent out by Sheriff Crenshaw.
