Watch the city and county grow next year, but don't be caught with city lots and farm property with inflated values pumped into them by speculators who are sending realty out of sight.

The "White Slave" question is a subject that is being talked about more or less in this city since two unfortunates were imported and opened up a resort outside the city limits. And is the authorities going

to allow the "White Slaves" to remain there?

It is reported that another change is to be made in the management of the Herald and that Rollie W. Watson will have to take back the newspaper and assume the indebtedness to save himself. This again proves the folly of turning over a newspaper plant to any Tom, Dick or Harry without a bean.

The Tillamook Hose Company is in need of a new hose and other appliances. No matter how willing the boys are to fight fire, if they are not furnished with the proper appliance to cope with it their efforts are not as effective as otherwise would be. The life of the present hose is exhausted, and to prevent a repetition of what took place at the Wise fire some years ago, a new hose is necessary, the bursting of three sections of hose on Friday night proves that the hose is getting played out.

The hose company have saved considerable property in this city, for which it is entitled to a great deal of credit, but it should be furnished with reliable appliances to fight fire in the future. There is always a chance of a city with frame buildings being wiped out at any time, and to prevent a fire from spreading is what save a city like this from being wiped out.

Secretary Walton, of the Port of Tillamook, is wanting to know whether the money illegally collected should be returned. What's the use of going to that trouble and then taxing the people for the same amount? Keep it by all means. The Port will meet with plenty of troubles without starting troubles over a little affair like that. What we want the Port to do, is to straighten and improve the slough, and more money the Port can get quicker will be the improvement follow. Our advice is for the Port to hang on to the

money and spend it economically and where it will do the most work. It is costing the county considerable money to operate the rock crusher to improve the roads in the Fairview section, and as the improvement of the slough is of far more importance to the center of the county, we fail to see why anyone should object to spending this money on this important commercial highway.

To the Taxpayers of Tillamook County.

TO THE EDITOR TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT. The writer would be pleased to get some expression of opinion from any taxpayer on the question as to whether or not the 1908 Port of Tillamook tax should be returned. This is a knotty matter most advantageous to the public welfare, but which the public in general does not appear to take much interest in. At the last regular meeting of the Port there was no one, outside of the members, present, not even a representative of the press.

This question of returning this money has two sides to it, and on behalf of both there is much to be said. To apportion this money to the hundreds of taxpayers who are interested in it, mail each one a check, figure the rebates, interest, etc., is a big job to do it. If the Port returned the money there would be no money on hand to pay the clerk who did the work. Moreover, if this money is retained and not returned the levy for the coming year will be just that proportionate amount. In addition, if the present Port retains this money, it will do practically no injustice since everybody, with the exception of perhaps one, or two individuals, have paid the tax.

On the other hand, the present Port of Tillamook perhaps has no moral right to this tax money, certainly no legal right for the courts have decided that it was not regularly done.

Let's hear what the public have to say about this and let the taxpayers drop in and hear the deliberations and work being started by the Port. The next regular meeting will be held on Thursday, Jan. 6, 1910, and will be held at the City Hall, at 7:30 o'clock.

TILLAMOOK WINS [CASES. Three Suits Result in Decisions Favorable to County.

SALEM, Or., Dec 28.—Three suits brought respectively by the Nehalem Packing Company, the Elmore Packing Company and Sam Elmore against Tillamook County, were all decided by the Supreme Court today in favor of the county.

In these actions the packing companies sought to secure a reduction of their assessments, but writs of review, issued by the County Court were quashed by the Circuit Court. The Supreme Court holds that property may be assessed to the person in whose possession it is found at the time the Assessor made the levy, even though the property may be owned by others. Also, it is held that the fact that a certain piece of property is assessed at a higher rate than surrounding property is no reason why the higher assessment should be reduced, but, on the contrary, should be the basis for an increase in the assessment of the surrounding property if it be shown that said surrounding property is assessed at less than its cash value. Opinions by Justice Eakin in all three cases.
