

TO BUILD UP NECANICUM. Well Supported Rumor that Plans are Afoot for a Railroad.

A document was recorded in the county clerk's office yesterday which according to a plausible and well supported rumor, marks the first step in a Clatsop county development move of the first magnitude, the building of a railroad from Seaside, all the way up the Necanicum river to a junction with the P. R. & N. line now under construction between Hillsboro and Tillamook.

According to reports from persons closely in touch with affairs in that part of the county a broad expansion of the interests of the Seaside Manufacturing and Lumber company is shortly to take place, one feature of which will be a logging road up the Necanicum, to be succeeded by a common carrier road as the country develops.

According to this authority, the Hammond interests, which have large holdings in that section, are friendly to the project and have offered to give a right-of-way through their property for nearly a nominal price for the stumpage cut from the right of way. The Necanicum valley offers a natural thoroughfare down the coast almost to the border of Clatsop county, with a low divide giving access into the waters of the Nehalem and with a right of way secured almost gratis the cost of constructing the road, it is believed, would be comparatively low.

Discussion of this project arises out of a bond mortgage filed for record yesterday by the Seaside Manufacturing company whereby that company is floating a loan of \$175,000, under written by the Astoria Savings bank, which latter organization is the mortgagee as trustee for purchasers of the bonds. The issue is in denominations of \$500 and \$250 and it is secured by the entire holdings of the company, including the plant, real estate and timber. The issue is to run for ten years with interest at six per cent and it is provided that any part of the loan may be called in at 105 per cent of the par value at any time after November 1, 1910.

The bond further provides that the mortgagor company shall create a sinking fund by setting aside \$1.50 for every thousand feet of lumber manufactured, which shall be applied to the taking up of the bonds by lot at stated periods.

THE ARGO WRECK UNDER CLOSER SCRUTINY.

Inspectors Take Testimony Which Completely Exonerates Capt. Snyder.

To substantiate or disprove an affidavit sent to Supervising Inspector John Birmingham from Tillamook that Captain Levi Snyder, master of the illfated steamer Argo, wrecked off Tillamook, December 8, at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon, was paralyzed with fear during the disaster, and that he had no sky-rockets aboard, United States Inspectors Edwards and Fuller examined witnesses to the affair again Tuesday morning. The charges in the affidavit were fully disproved.

The revival of the case came up rather unexpectedly. After being given a hearing the local board of inspectors suspended the license of Captain Snyder for 12 months, finding that he was careless and negligent in attempting to cross in over Tillamook bar in stormy weather on a half-ebb tide. At that time nothing came out in testimony relative to the captain's alleged misdemeanor or as to whether there were any rockets aboard. The decision for the suspension of his license was made December 8.

About 10 days later, it appears, Captain Snyder appealed from the lower court, taking it up with Supervising Inspector Birmingham, of San Francisco. In the meantime Captain Birmingham received the affidavit reflecting very seriously on the behavior of the master of the Argo. Then the supervising inspector requested the local board to secure additional testimony from the officers and members of the crew of the Argo for his guidance in reviewing the case.

Those testifying Tuesday morning were: Levi Snyder, master; J. A. Johnson, mate; J. H. Snyder, chief engineer; W. A. Simpson, purser; Charles Frederickson, fireman; John Woldhouse, E. Solmonson, sailors. Evidence was brought out showing that the captain was cool and collected throughout the trying ordeal and attended to his duties the best he could under such circumstances. It was also shown that there were six skyrockets aboard. The additional testimony will be forwarded to San Francisco at once.
