A meeting of the automobilists in this city was called on Wednesday evening at Snodgrass' building for the purpose of organizing, but instead of doing so those present took up the matter of forming a Commercial Club, and another effort is to be made in that direction.

The lumber schooner San Buena Ventura, which was tied up in this city some years ago, drifted ashore on Friday at the mouth of Rogus River and was wrecked. The captain and his wife and crew put off in a boat and were picked up by a passing steamer and landed in San Francisco.

Most every week there is a business change in this city, and from all appearances a large number of persons will be here this year looking for business openings and investments, as it is generally conceded that Tillamook City and county will make rapid growth for the next few years.

A bill of sale was filed in the Custom house at Astoria whereby E. E. Jenkins sells a half interest in the gasoline launch Henrietta No. 2 to Eugene Jenkins for \$2000. The craft, which was recently built by Wilson Bros., of Astoria, and brought to this city, is of 10 tons net register and is being operated in the freight and passenger service from Tillamook City to bay points.

E. T. Haltom left Wednesday on a business trip, going out by way of Sheridan, and Miss Nell Whittemore accompanied him. They go to Spokane to meet the New York representatives of the combination of stores to buy spring goods. After getting through purchasing from the New York representatives, Mr. Haltom will go to Chicago and St. Louis, and after getting through with business at those place will pay his mother a visit in Tennessee.

The reason that the return marriage certificate had not been returned to the County Clerk in the specified time in the marriage of F. H. Bush and Ruth M. Easter was on account of Justice Sappington, who married the couple, failing to place it on file, and the cause of this being overlooked was, no doubt, on account of the justice's sickness after the marriage and previous to his death. This straightens out all the marriages, but there are yet a number of persons who are liable to fines for not reporting deaths or burying them without having the proper certificates. It is impossible for the County Health Officer, Dr. I. M. Smith, to keep a correct record of births and deaths, when those whose duty it is to do so fail to comply with the law.

A constitutional question of interest was decided by the Supreme Court in the opinion in the case of the State of Oregon vs. W. Langworthy, a Tillamook County local option case. Langworthy was convicted in Circuit Court of violating the local option law upon his appeal to the Supreme Court lost. The opinion rendered is upon a motion for a rehearing which is denied. It was alleged by defendant that his trial on a warrant issued out of the Justice Court, was in violation of the constitution, the amendment of June 1, 1908, providing that no person shall be tried for a crime in the Circuit Court, without first having been indicted by the Grand Jury. The court calls attention to the fact that this provision is limited to trials in the Circuit Court and only to trials originating there.
