NEW CHEESE FORMS. An English Method Provides Smaller Sizes.

Consult Charles N. Daniels, of Sheffield, has prepared the following interesting account of a new method of marketing cheese in England.

One of the favorite varieties of English cheese is known as Wensleydale, so called after one of the dales in Yorkshire, where it is made.

Last year there appeared upon the market a small cheese identical in appearance with the Wensleydale, weighing 1 to 1 1/4 pounds, about 3 1/2 inches in diameter and 4 1/2 inches long.

While the cost of preparing cheese for the market in this form may be a trifle more, it is sold at the same price per pound as that cut from the larger ones, namely, 1c. (24 cents) per pound.

The demand for these small cheeses having forced them on the market, a debatable question is whether in this form the cheese will ripen as fully as it would if made in larger mold.
