In the case of W. H. Himes et al. vs. William Maxwell et al, tried at the last term of the circuit court, Judge Burnett has dismissed the case, with costs assessed to the plaintiffs. The judge, in rendering his decision, states that George H. Himes was probably of weak mind and easily persuaded when he signed his name to the deed in question, but he had sufficient reason and judgment to know and understand the nature, quality and consequences of a conveyance of real property such as was mentioned and described in the second amended complaint.

About fifteen ladies with their babies accepted the invitations, and the residence having been tastefully arranged, the guests had a delightful afternoon. One feature of the afternoon's entertainment was the exhibition of photographs of the mothers when they were babies and the guessing as to who they were. Mrs. Crenshaw won the prize for the most number of correct guesses. At the dainty lunch each child was given a present. Mrs. Walton and her sister, Miss Fawk, are deserving of a great deal of praise for the tasteful and pretty manner in which they had arranged the party, and all were delighted with the unique manner in which they were entertained.  
Judge Burnett has rendered a decision in the case of S. V. Anderson vs. the Miami Lumber Company in favor of the former. The case was tried at the last term of the circuit court, and was taken under advisement. The company had failed to live up to a contract to remove the timber from Anderson's land by a specified date, consequently the lumber company was enjoined from removing it. The judge in his decision cites that the wording of the deed which expired May 10, 1900, "that the title to all timber not so removed and remaining on said premises at the expiration of said period of five years shall revert to and become vested absolutely in the grantors herein," is binding, and that the title to and property in the timber remaining on the real property, whether in the shape of standing trees, felled trees or saw logs cut from trees not having been transported beyond the boundaries of the real property on or before the specified time reverted to and became vested absolutely in the plaintiffs in this suit.
