McKeen Pleads Guilty.

A. C. McKeen, the "Owl" organizer, who was arrested and returned here for trial, pleaded guilty last week before Justice Stanley, to the charge made against him of obtaining five dollars from A. E. Nolan, by falsely claiming to be authorized to organize "Nests" of the order. Under a law passed by the last legislature this offense was made a misdemeanor with a maximum punishment of a fine of \$100 and three months in jail. The justice imposed a fine of \$20.00 and costs and required McKeen to pay the expenses which the county had incurred in arresting him and keeping him in the case, amounting to \$20.00. McKeen paid the fine and left at once for his home in Oakland, having received a telegram that his wife was dangerously sick. As soon as he learned that the Nolan charge was settled, Earl Ford, city marshal, made another complaint on the same ground, McKeen having duped him and gotten \$5.00 from him in the same way, but the Sheriff has not yet been able to locate McKeen, so as to arrest him on the new charge.

There was considerable protest and complaint on the part of a number of those whom McKeen had taken in, against McKeen being let off with a fine on only one charge, as there were quite a large number who had been taken in the same way as Nolan and Ford. However Nolan had signified his intention of appearing against McKeen on the charge which he had made, so the Sheriff thought it advisable to have the matter settled as it was, thinking it better to have the county reimbursed for what it had to pay out in the matter and also saving any further expense for keeping the prisoner in jail for several months.

Under the plan pursued by the "Owl," a \$3.00 fee was charged for initiation, which was collected by an organizer, and he was required to send in to the head "Nest" \$20.00, of which the local "Nest" gets its funds, charter and supplies, the organizer retaining the remainder of his services. As there were nearly a hundred here there was a lot of things in it for the organizer who had been doing things the proper way. Those who paid their dues to McKeen took the matter up with the head "Nest" and have been paying their charter and supplies the payment of only \$45.00, so they are only losers to that extent. They are getting all they would have gotten anyhow with the \$45 as extra expense. It appears that McKeen had been employed by the head "Nest," but had been discharged, but claimed to have been authorized by another organizer to come to Tillamook and do the work for him at this place. It also appears from letters written by McKeen that the money he took was lost in gambling and there are rumors that quite a good deal of money was lost in that way here in Tillamook.

On taking up the work of inspection I found a great difference in the methods used by the makers at the factories in the manufacturing of cheese. In about half the factories they were not using the rennet test, setting the milk just as it happened to be, receiving it, without any regard to acid, which accounted for so much gasy and ununiform cheese.

They are now using either the Harrison or Marshal rennet tests and are ripening the milk, using starters when necessary. As a result the cheese show a marked improvement there being few exceptions where gas has developed. In some factories I found cheese sticking to dirty shelves and poorly pressed, which is conducive of mold, and paraffined, not with any knowledge as to why it was applied, simply because the market demanded it. While at the same time the factories had their cheese in first class shape at all times.

The present condition of cheese throughout the county will prove that if it is properly handled and paraffined, mold is unnecessary.

I notice an improvement in the quality of milk throughout the county, which is a move in the right direction, as the makers cannot manufacture first class cheese without it. And as the quality of milk improves, starters become more necessary. Therefore, I will suggest that the directors of the different factories provide equipment with which to pasturize milk to be used in making the Commercial starter, which is without a doubt the most uniform, and they cannot afford to be without it. Any other improvements to assist the maker in his work, is money well spent.

In two or three instances I found the makers were compelled to neglect the vats while trying to maintain steam with wet wood.

Where I found second grade cheese, the maker's attention was called to it, and he usually rectified the mistake. Also a report of same was handed to the secretary which enabled him to segregate it from first grade goods.

The Association inspected the cheese produced in 12 factories the past season, and one tenth of a cent per lb. cheese manufactured during the months of March to and including July was charged the several factory organizations for the services. The total amount of cheese inspected was nearly 2,750,000 lbs and would make a trifle more than one twentieth of a cent for the cheese produced at each of said factories for the year.

There can be no question but what the inspecting of Tillamook cheese helped to raise the quality of the cheese produced in this county. Formerly a number of the cheesemakers would work in their poorstock with the better grade of cheese and until the cheese reached the market would the same be detected as a rule.

Two or three other factories not now in the association have spoken to the writer and wish to have their cheese inspected if it is possible to have it done. From reports at present the association will have more cheese to inspect the coming year than the last one. It would certainly be taking a step backward to discontinue the inspection altogether.

Pointed Scraps.

In addition to its regular dividends the harvester trust is about to hand stockholders \$20,000,000. The failure to give a slice of the melon to farmers seems ungenerous, and the man with the market basket also is overlooked.

The statement that a hide trust has advanced the prices of hides this winter, after the tariff or hides was abolished last summer, is not encouraging to those who insist that only tariffs are breeders of trusts. But they will not be discouraged enough to stop saying it.

The Kansas state food inspector has unearthed another "butter dodge." You may have noticed offers of a chemical by the aid of which you can take a half pound of butter and a half pound of water and make a whole pound of solid butter. Mr. Kleinhaus got some of the chemical and had his wife try it. To his surprise the product was up to advance notices, and it could hardly be told from an all-pure-butter product.

The inspector is now going to keep a sharp look out for any defrauding that may be attempted along this line, and if you are tempted by any at the alluring advertising, and claims for this chemical or preparation, our advice would be—don't.

Mr. Taft's advice to the insurgents to "Get busy, and stop quarreling," is good advice. It is the kind of counsel which the masses of the Republicans throughout the country would give, if they had the ear of Congress. Apparently, too, this counsel finds the insurgents in a receptive mood. At the House caucus everything was peaceful. The programme went through smoothly from beginning to end. Both the president and the country want the Republicans in Congress to stop warring and go to work. In its platform of 1908 the Republican party made certain promises in regard to legislation, and an attempt must be made to carry them out. A start was taken in the special session, by the enactment of the Payne tariff. That act is giving an excellent account of itself. It is furnishing more revenue than the Dingley law afforded, and at the same time it is giving ample protection to every important interest which needs any. That act will aid the party in the congressional campaign of 1910 and in the presidential canvass of 1912. Threats were recently made by the Democrats that they would attack the Payne act in the campaign this year, but the chances now are that they will say very little about it. The Republican campaign managers would welcome an assault on the tariff by the Democrats. It would give the Republicans an issue which could be relied on to win tens of thousands of new votes for them in every indu-

trial state. A Democratic attack on the tariff in the campaign this year would make some of the rock-ribbed Democratic districts of Alabama, Tennessee, North Carolina, and Louisiana decidedly doubtful.
