An 8 inch water pipe, fed by a mountain stream supplies water to every part of the place. If one cares to do so this may be used for irrigating any part or all of the land.

HARBORS BARS BIG TIMBER OPERATIONS

Tillamook Must Be Improved Before Logging Becomes Extensive.

(From the Telegram.) Before extensive timber or lumber operations are opened down on the Tillamook side of the Coast range divide, Tillamook harbor must be improved so as to admit regular sailings of at least the Coast steam fleet. This announcement is common to the heavy timber interests of the Tillamook basin. Logging back over the mountain divide is regarded as out of the question, when prices are anywhere near their present positions. Putting common lumber on cars for Eastern shipment is equally absurd, for only the higher grades will stand the railway haul. This combination of facts causes the timber owners to say that they must have water transportation before opening their holdings.

A vent of the Lytle railway in Tillamook will give the country tremendous impetus. Farm products will come out in large quantities, orchards will be opened, and the big dairy industry possible there will spring to the front rank when given the regular service made possible with a railway. All of the higher grades of lumber will be shipped out also. The railway will open traffic, and traffic will bring the people. Tillamook is expected to forge ahead at lightning Oregon pace in the next few years. But the lumber industry, say timbermen, will not attain its zenith there until the bar is made passable.

Bar in Bad Shape. At present the bar is in very poor condition. Residents of Tillamook country have been urging the Congressional delegation to do something to improve it. It is argued that a limited appropriation will suffice to make the harbor quite safe. When opened in this manner, Tillamook interests have been assured of regular steamship connection by Mr. Schwerin and other managers. Such connection would open the California market to Tillamook for the immeasurable quantities of rough lumber which will be turned out when the 27,000,000,000 to 30,000,000,000 feet of standing timber is manufactured. With California taking the rough, all of the higher grades would be shipped to the East, on the same principle as the other Coast districts now operate.

Recognizing that this development is a due counterpart for railway improvement, a strenuous effort is to be made from this time on for harbor work at Tillamook. One concern's management has said that they would open on a big scale within 18 months after proper water transportation was given the district, but would do nothing earlier. Several others are understood to occupy the same position. They believe the time has arrived when extensive manufacturing there is warranted, if water facilities can be had. Given a good bar crossing, these Tillamook men promise to start within two years afterward a mighty lumber industry in that basin, such as Willapa and Grays Harbor have. Believing that water connection would be of as great value as a railway, and that the two are essential in developing Tillamook, plans are being formulated for pressing the cause of harbor improvement, and the campaign is not to be abated until success is attained.

All West of Divide. The Lytle railway crosses the Coast range at an elevation of about 1800 feet. All of the great Tillamook forest lies on the west side of this divide. Logging for the distance involved and over such a lift as this, is regarded improbable until prices have soared far beyond present levels. Hauling common lumber out of the basin, to compete with that reaching the market from nearer mills, is also held to be an unpromising traffic for the present. But the higher grades, which are sent for long distance by railways, will not be affected by such a trifling haul as that from Tillamook to the common starting point of Portland. It is because of these conditions that the Tillamook men believe the heavy railway interests will now be linked with them in a determined effort to have harbor improvements made, so as to give all traffic a great impetus.
