Red Clover Falls Below Other Factories in Price.

At their annual meeting the
 stockholders of the Red Clover
 Creamery elected their directors
 and the report of the past year's
 business was read. Some of the
 patrons thought they had not been
 receiving as high prices for their
 cheese as some others and thought
 they would like to join with the co-
 operative creameries as far as
 selling their cheese went, but these
 were finally voted down.

When asked about it Carl Haber-
 lach, who is selling for most of the
 factories in this county, said: "All
 during the past season a num-
 ber of the Red Clover Cream-
 ery patrons have asked me if
 I would sell their cheese and
 I told them I would far rather
 not, but if they really wished me to
 I would do so for them. I told them
 that I thought it was far better for
 me not to have all the factories
 around Tillamook, as then they
 would have no factory with which
 to compare prices and to see whet-
 her I was getting as much for cheese
 as the others were getting. Just as
 soon as one got all the factories
 around here some people would

commence to kick and think they
 could do better, and they would not
 be able to compare prices of cheese
 with any one else. After all, as far
 as the salesman is concerned, the
 prices he receives for good cheese
 is as far as he can be judged, the
 matter of what cheese the cream-
 eries get for 100 lbs. being entirely
 with the cheese makers and the
 solids in the milk at the different
 factories.

"To illustrate my first point: For
 the year 1909 the Red Clover Cream-
 ery sent their cheese to the Hazel-
 wood Cream Co. and received an
 average of 14.92c. per lb. For
 the same year I received for the
 factories around Tillamook the
 following prices for their cheese:
 Fairview, 15.43c. per lb.; Clover Leaf,
 15.45c.; Maple Leaf, 15.46c.; Elwood
 Creamery, 15.49c.; Tillamook Cream-
 ery, 15.413c. and South Prairie
 Creamery, 15.37c. Some factories
 made more Young Americas than
 others and some factories had a
 larger proportion of their year's milk
 when the cheese market was high-
 est, explains the difference in the
 prices of the several factories. You
 will note, however, that our
 prices were an average of over 1/2c.
 per lb. cheese higher than the prices

paid the Red Clover Creamery.
 This should assure the patrons for
 whom I sell cheese that they have
 been getting all in prices that the
 market allowed, as the Hazelwood
 people are good salesmen and have
 done well with the Red Clover
 people, better, probably, than they
 could do elsewhere. They further
 employ good, competent salesmen
 and keep right after the trade, and
 they also have only the very best
 cheesemakers and make a fine
 article of cheese.

"We have had inspection of Till-
 amook cheese at most of the
 factories this season, and it has im-
 proved the quality at every one of
 them. It has helped the general
 price in every factory in the county
 whether its cheese was inspected or
 not, but it has helped the inspected
 cheese the most. The cost of in-
 spection has been so small and the
 beneficial results so great through-
 out the country that it is hard to
 conceive of the dairymen dropping
 it now. I think we should all en-
 deavor to do what we can to im-
 prove Tillamook's famous product
 that the fame of its cheese may be
 increased and that we will be justi-
 fied in asking and obtaining higher
 prices for Tillamook cheese!"
