She came to Oregon by the Ismas of Panama from New York in 1858, and lived in Portland until 1880. She then removed to Tillamook, where she lived until her return to Portland over a year ago. She was the mother of 11 children, six of whom are now living, Mrs. W. Johnson Mrs. H. H. Brown, Mrs. E. M. Martin, Mrs. C. F. Groce, Wm. O'Hara, all of Portland, and Bat O'Hara, of Netarts. She is survived by her aged husband. Her funeral took place last Friday morning from St. Patrick's church, Portland.

The steamer Golden Gate arriving at Astoria Saturday evening from Tillamook, had a narrow escape from getting in serious trouble at the mouth of the river that afternoon. Just as the vessel was approaching the bar, she blew out a boiler rivet and as the steam escaped she was practically helpless. Fortunately she was outside the line of breakers and by setting sail was able to work her way into deep water. She set distress signals and the steamer Elmore that was coming in notified the tug Wallula of the Golden Gate's predicament. The tug went out immediately, but when she arrived the crew had placed a patch on the Golden Gate's boiler and she was able to come in under her own steam.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Some Important Ordinances Introduced.

The regular meeting of the city council was held on Monday evening, when Mayor Thos. Coates and Councilmen Talbot, Wilt, Brodhead, Harrison and Laughlin were present.

H. Crenshaw, chief of the hose company, was present, and asked for an additional 250 feet of hose, but on the recommendation of Mayor Coates, it was agreed that the city council should purchase 1000 feet of hose from the Pacific Coast Rubber Co. at 90c. a foot. An ordinance to extend Third street was read and passed to its final reading.

And ordinance to define, prohibit and punish vagrancy was passed to its second reading, the first clause of the ordinance reading as follows: "Any person who lives idly, or lives without any settled home, or who has no visible means of living or lawful occupation or employment, or is found begging or living in any tipping house, without being employed therein, or owner or part owner thereof, or who shall be found roaming the streets in idleness at any time of the pay or night, without any apparent or real necessity therefor, shall be deemed to be, and is hereby defined to be a vagrant."

The penalty is a fine not less than \$10 and not more than \$100, or be imprisoned in the city jail not less than five days nor more than 20 days, or by both such fines and imprisonment.

An ordinance to regulate the storage of gasoline, naphtha and distillate and to prescribe punishment for any violations of the ordinance, was read a second time. The ordinance makes it unlawful to keep or to have in storage at any place within the corporate limits any more than 50 gallons, unless the same be buried and stored in the ground or earth at not less than four feet beneath the surface.

An ordinance to prohibit persons, not members of the fire department from interfering with the same at fire, and authorizing the fire chief to call upon persons for assistance, and to constitute and appoint all members of the fire department ex-officio police officers during the times of fire drills and fires, and prescribing punishment for any violation, was passed to its second reading.
