The annual dance, to be given by the Tillamook Hose Company, will take place on Tuesday evening, Feb. 22, at the opera house, the proceeds of which will go towards buying two hose carts for the thousand feet of new hose ordered by the city.

Although the government only allows compensation for one assistant in the post office in this city, Postmaster W. F. Baker, to expedite the handling of the mail, has added Miss Frankie Smith to the post office staff, who was formerly in the telephone office.

Another set of lock boxes and a desk for the public to use were added to the post office this week. The desk was much needed, as persons were getting into the habit of writing letters at the money order window, which often kept persons waiting until they were through.

Justice Stanley decided the case in favor of the defendant.

The Supreme Court Monday denied the petition of J. Thorburn Ross, president of the defunct Title Guarantee & Trust Company, for a rehearing. The findings of the lower court are affirmed, but are modified to the extent that the fine of \$572.853.74 is set aside. Justice King dissents from the opinion of the court in a brief statement.

The Supreme Court declaring unconstitutional the law appropriating \$100,000 for the construction of the Crater Lake highway, it is indicated that \$10,000 voted for a bridge over the Snake River from Oregon to Idaho, may also be rescinded. At any event, Attorney L. H. McMahon, of Salem, who overthrew the Crater Lake appropriation, will continue his fight against the Snake River fund.

Unable to agree, the Hermann jury was discharged Monday morning, the panel standing 11 to 1 for conviction. George Selkirk, a Portlander, the lone Hermann advocate among the dozen deliberators, admitted under examination as to his qualifications as a jurymen, that he harbored an opinion as to Hermann's innocence or guilt. Attorney Heney did not hear the response and left Selkirk in the jury box unchallenged. Attorney Heney takes the result philosophically, but at first showed chagrin. Later rumors were heard in the Federal building that the graft prosecutor had begun investigation of actions of the jurymen who were kept under Government surveillance for more than five weeks.

Gives His Experiences.

TO THE EDITOR TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.

After an absence from home for nearly two months, I have come back to dear old Tillamook, satisfied with this country better than ever, and I always liked it. I was holding revival meetings in Whatcom county, Wash. Am glad to report good meetings and a number of conversions, but I want to tell you especially of my trip, as I have traveled in all kinds of things, except battle ships and flying machines, and really am able to eat and walk about the house and expect to fully recover in a few days.

I left Tillamook December 25th, on the steamer Sue Elmore. Had a rolling time, but I enjoyed it, but my mind was made up to return, if life was spared, via North Yamhill route and, gents, believe me, I had experiences over that line of road I shall never forget.

We left one hour late and our jolly drive decided to make up that lost time at any cost, and the way we made the down hill runs was amazing to a tenderfoot. We arrived at Fairdale in due time with an appetite that would have been dangerous only in a Christian land, but the dinner was sufficient to meet all our need, and after resting while the packing was done, the real start was made. Snow was soon reached, the pack horses turned loose, and the warning yell and crack of the whip was understood by the horses to mean trot where it was possible. I won't attempt to describe the trail in the snow. It was 4 ft. deep. The summit was reached at 5 p.m., a rest of 20 minutes. Packs looked after, coffee drank, good bye was said to man on the top of the hill, and we were off for Trask, and really where our horses couldn't walk, the horse learned to slide, and frequently our mounts seemed to be a live taboggan. I was amused, frightened and really scared, but was not hurt. At 9 p.m. the driver pointed out the light at our stopping place. The 'in-lord' as it was called us to dismount, unrap and led the way to a roar-

ing good fire in an old fashioned fire place. Oh say, it was a fitting place to close a day like we had spent in the mountains. King Edward don't need any better fire than the tired travelers received at Trask, and to know he is actually a Tillamooker makes it all the better.

At 3:30 there is a call to get out. Breakfast is served and all seated in the stage. Off we go, but so dark we could not see. At daylight we had come into the celebrated Tillamook county, where fine dwellings, good barns and new school houses and a general air of prosperity was seen on every hand. I expect to settle down at home, near Cloverdale, and do my best to be a citizen, worthy of what I consider one of the favored localities of earth. Let's make Tillamook a noted place, not only for cheese and high priced land, but let's become noted because of our unity of purposes and moral standing. In closing let me say if you can't make a trip around the world just go out with Captain Schrader and come in over the Trask and you will be old in experiences of travel.
