Andrew D. White ex-president of Cornell, and former ambassador to Germany, in a recent interview made the rather startling prediction that not less than 5000 persons will be murdered during the next twelve months. He considers the wave of crime which is passing over this country in the present generation as the gravest problem with which we have to deal and characterizes the conditions of criminal justice in this country as frightful.

At last something like a general agreement has been reached by both elements of the Republicans to quit quarrelling and to push to enactment several measures which are on the party's program. These include the postal savings bank bill, which is now in discussion in the senate; the various parts of the proposition to amend the interstate commerce act of 1906; federal charters for such corporations as voluntarily ask for them; presidential authority to withdraw from entry all public lands desired for conservation purposes, the withdrawals to remain in force until revoked by president or Congress; statehood for Arizona and New Mexico on a plan which will provide for the president's approval of the constitutions for the proposed states before Congress is called upon to ratify them, thus averting the possibility of freak provisions like some of those which were in Oklahoma's constitution; and a ship subsidy measure. This determination by the Republicans to push constructive work was not reached too soon. Congress will have to carry out Republican pledges if the Republican party is to maintain itself in the elections next November.

President Taft gave a talk to 120 newspaper men at the Press Club in Washington, where he went by appointment, dressed as he happened to be after a walk about the streets, incognito. He apologized for his clothes, which included a gray sweater and no top coat, and told some amusing incidents of his walk, during which he said almost no one recognized him. Among other things he compared his present work at the White House with what he had experienced as a judge, saying that the latter was sustained by mental effort, while his present work arises from the consumption of nervous energy and vitality in rubbing up against one's fellow-men. He found it hard to recognize this as work and consequently was not aware that he had been to work until exhaustion overtook him and it was time to go to bed. He deplored the fact that at the White House everybody comes by appointment, and no one ever "drops in," as they had a right to.

The commissioner of internal revenue has sent out a warning to all companies liable under the corporation tax provision of the tariff act of 1909 that they must file their reports on or before March 1. The reports must cover the gross and net earnings for the calendar year 1909. Penalties for neglect of this precaution range from \$100 to \$500. As scarcely a tenth of the concerns covered by this tax provision have yet filed their reports, there is a chance for trouble for many of them.

The American people already have over \$14,000,000 in banks. If a postal savings system increased the amount materially the French laurels in thrift would be in danger.

It is a safe proposition that there can not be too many workers on the farms, and prevailing prices indicate that farming, on the average, is the most profitable business.

U.S. Liquor Law. Vendors of liquors in prohibition states have usually been careful to pay the United States tax, so as not to bring themselves into conflict with the United States, call down its penalties on themselves and supply proofs to the state that they were violators of the state laws also. When caught by the United States such offenders against its laws usually have been fined merely, have paid the penalty in money, and nothing more said about it. But a change in this policy is now announced by the Attorney-General of the United States.

The Governor of Kansas has protested against the acceptance of the money penalty by the United States, as full satisfaction for violation of its law. In a letter to President Taft he has insisted that imprisonment for some reasonable time, as provided by law, should be added to the penalty, on conviction of this offense against the law of the United States.

The President referred the matter to the Attorney-General, who has instructed the United States District Attorney for Kansas that "in future in prosecutions for violations of the internal revenue laws, as a general policy, he is to refuse to compromise full liability by the payment of money penalties, and to endeavor to secure convictions and imprisonment for some reasonable time in punishment of this class of offenses."

This instruction will leave the effect of making liquor-sellers in all "dry" territory more careful not to come into conflict with the laws of the United States, but to comply at all points strictly with the internal revenue laws. The violators have not been numerous, since few have been willing to take the risk. But they will be even less frequent hereafter.—Oregonian.

REPUBLICANS CALL STATE ASSEMBLY

Counties Will Name 1248 Delegates.—Unanimous Vote Adopts Plan. Without a single discordant note, the members of the Republican state central committee, at a meeting in Portland city Saturday, authorized Judge M. C. George, the newly-elected chairman, to call a state assembly to be held in Portland, Thursday, July 21.

This assembly will consist of 1248 delegates, apportioned by the committee among the 34 counties of the state on a basis of one delegate to every 50 votes or major fraction that were cast for R. R. Butler for Presidential elector in November, 1908. Twenty-seven counties were represented at the meeting, the proceedings of which were marked with uninterrupted unanimity.

No Dissenting Vote Heard. The large and representative state assembly was indorsed by the committee without a dissenting voice on the recommendation of a sub-committee of five members which had been appointed to prepare and submit some method of procedure for calling and holding such an advisory gathering. The members of this committee were: R. B. Williams, of Polk; C. I. Early, of Hood River; H. T. Botts, of Tillamook; C. S. Moore, of Klamath, and C. E. Cochran, of Union.

In counties outside of Multnomah, it was recommended that delegates to the state assembly be selected by county assemblies and that delegates to the county gatherings be chosen by majority vote only at mass meetings of the voters in the different precincts, these meetings to be called by the county central committee. Saturday, July 9, is the date recommended for the precinct mass meetings, with the date for the county assemblies fixed for the following Saturday, July 16.

Multnomah County Excepted.

From this plan of organizing county assembly and electing delegates to the state assembly, Multnomah County was excepted. In this county the committee found that it would be impracticable, because of the large number of voters, to hold precinct mass meetings. It was voted to leave the matter to the county central committee with the understanding that it would exercise its judgment in adopting some plan calculated to produce the best results.

Dr. J. N. Smith, of Marion, and J. H. Worsley, of Wasco, asked that the same discretion be left to the county central committee of their counties with the result that, following some discussion, the original report of the committee was amended to the extent that in other counties where it was deemed advisable the method of procedure in electing delegates to the state assembly might be determined by the county central committee.

Proxies will not be allowed in the state assembly if the recommendations of the state committee are adhered to. On this subject the committee took no compromise position. It voted to eliminate from the state gathering all proxies. The committee did recommend, however, that the vote of absent and duly elected delegates to the state gathering shall be cast according to the majority opinion of those present and acting from the same county. This method, it was contended, will insure the polling of the full vote of every county in the assembly and at the same time be expressive of the wishes of the particular locality interested.

As to Congressional and district assemblies, the state committee recommended that assemblies for the Congressional and district offices be held during the recess of the state assembly; that the delegates to the Congressional and district assemblies be the same delegates as shall represent those districts at the state assembly; that all recommendations of the Congressional and district assemblies be reported back to the state assembly.

25 MILES OF RAILROAD IS NEARLY READY.

Tillamook City and Nehalem will be Connected by Rail by April 1. Passenger train service on 25 miles of completed road at the western end of the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company's Tillamook line will be inaugurated on April 1. Only work trains are now in operation over that portion of the railroad.

E. E. Lytle, president of the railroad company, said last week that a locomotive and several passenger cars would soon be shipped by water around to Tillamook Bay for the purpose of establishing the passenger train service. It was in this manner that the work locomotive and construction cars now in use were taken to the Bay.

The 25 miles of railroad to be opened to passenger traffic will be between Tillamook and Vosburg, which will give service to Bay City, Hobsonville and other intermediate stations.

Force of 800 at Work.

There are now about 800 men at work along the line between Hillsboro and Tillamook and construction is in progress at both ends. At the western end of the road about 15 miles of rails have already been laid and the grade is ready for the laying of seven more miles. The grading will be completed and the rails laid for the remainder of the 25 miles to be put in operation as soon as weather conditions improve a little.

The principal work now in progress is in construction of bridges and in tunnel and rock cut excavations. Dirt work has been delayed by rainy weather. At the higher elevations along the line there is now from three to six feet of snow. Tunnel No. 1, the longest of the nine on the road, has been completed. This tunnel is 1400 feet long and is 24 1/2 miles west of Hillsboro. At the western end of the road 3 1/2 miles of track have been laid, making 64 1/2 miles down in all.

Labor Found Scarce.

The contract calls for the completion of the road through to Tillamook by June 1, but scarcity of labor and the unusually bad weather conditions may prevent the completion of the railroad within the time limit. Trains, it is expected, will be running through to Tillamook from Hillsboro late in the summer or early in the fall in any event.

The big demand for workmen in the Deschutes Canyon and on the Klamath Natron extension of the southern Pacific is causing a dearth in the labor market, according to officials in the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co.'s offices. The latter road, because of the mountainous construction, is at a disadvantage in bidding for workmen during the winter months, as the weather conditions are more favorable in the other camps. When summer comes, however, conditions will be reversed, and the work can be rushed to completion.

The Pacific Railway & Navigation Co.'s railroad will be 91 miles long and will penetrate the greatest timber belt of Western Oregon in addition to serving growing dairying districts and the beach country.

Heavy Timber Tributary.

The railroad begins at Hillsboro, 20 miles west of Portland, on the West Side division of the Southern Pacific. It runs northwesterly from Hillsboro to a divide in the Coast Range between the Upper Nehalem and Salmon Berry rivers. From there it follows the Salmon Berry to its confluence with the Nehalem; thence along the Nehalem to Nehalem Bay; thence along the south shore of Nehalem Bay to the ocean beach; thence along the beach; southerly to Garibaldi Point and thence along the east shore of Tillamook Bay to Bay City and Tillamook. In the division the railroad attains an altitude of 1800 feet. It is estimated that there is tributary to the new line 34,000,000 feet of standing timber. Numerous heavy bluffs have been necessary in excavating rock cuts, and a few days ago in blasting out several tons of rock in a big cut one boulder went flying through the roof of a near-by sawmill and crashed through the boiler, putting the mill out of business for several days.
