The Tillamook Lumber Manufacturing Company saw mill has been running throughout the winter, giving the city a steady pay roll, the few lay offs being on account of bad weather or when the mill was being improved. The planning department is being re-arranged this week and a new Berlin flooring machine installed, when the company will stock up with finished lumber for the summer trade, in the new lumber warehouse built for that purpose, and with a stock of doors, windows, sashes, shingles, etc., in the other warehouse, the mill company will be in good shape to furnish all kinds of building material, well seasoned, on short orders. The mill is turning out a railroad order this week, consisting of stringers and ties.

The commissioners of the Port of Nehalem have adopted resolutions providing for sale of \$50,000 of its bonds to secure funds to construct a jetty at the mouth of the Nehalem Bay to provide a ship channel to the sea with the depth of 20 to 22 feet. These bonds are issued to have 10 per cent of them mature each year after July, 1910. The entire amount will be retired at the

end of ten years. The construction of this jetty and the consequent improvement of the channel will entail development of an immense lumber industry on the Nehalem Bay. Tributary to the Bay is more 20,000,000,000 feet of the highest-grade timber stands. The bonds will be sold to the highest bidder April 16, and contracts for construction work will be let soon after that date.

ANOTHER MYSTERIOUS FIRE IN THE CITY.

Snodgrass' New Building is Believed to be Set on Fire After Firemen's Dance.

The annual dance of the Tillamook Hose Company had concluded but a short time when an alarm was turned in about 3 o'clock on Wednesday morning. The reflection of a fire in the mirror of Mr. and Mrs. Andy Nolan's bed room woke them up and as they expected to hear the fire alarm, but failing to do so, Andy dressed and hurried to the city hall to ring the fire alarm, and as he did so flames were leaping from the roof of E. D. Snodgrass' new building and garage. It was several minutes before there were any response, but several of the members of the hose company arriving, the fire apparatus was soon hurried to the scene of the fire, which had originated in a room on the North side of the building on the second floor. The fire had taken a good hold of the building when the fire fighters arrived, with the center part of the roof and the north side of the building all ablaze. With a strong wind blowing it looked as though the building was doomed. The fire, however, burned slow, owing to the green lumber, and this gave the hose company a show, and they succeeded in getting it under control and eventually in getting it extinguished. It took an effort to do so owing to the dense smoke, a number of the boys having to be relieved on account of it. The building was just completed and Mr. Snodgrass had made arrangements to move into it the next day. He cleaned up the building and swept the shavings into a room on Tuesday, and this appears to be where the fire originated. Mr. Snodgrass passed the building about half past

one on his way home from the dance, and it appears to be the impression that some one entered the building and either intentionally or accidentally set the heap of shavings on fire. The damage to the building will amount to about \$400. This is another bad loss for Mr. Snodgrass to sustained, for it will be remembered that when the building was nearly completed it was blown down during a wind storm.
