F. R. Beals filed a suit in the circuit court against Frank Tone for the recovery of nine head of cows, the same being in the possession of the defendant, and heretofore held by defendant under lease from M. A. Casey under a lease expiring Feb. 28, 1910, the value of the cows being placed at \$600.

Attorney H. T. Botts returned from San Francisco and Salem on Saturday, where he had gone to argue cases in the court of appeals and the supreme court. Attorney Duniway argued the case in the supreme court on Tuesday in the case of Boelk vs. Nolan, in which Mr. Botts is also interested.

It is reported that Tillamook is to have its first regular passenger train between Tillamook and Vossburg and that it will be running April first. Two petitions have been filed with the County Court to submit the question to a vote of the people as to establishing Ports at Bay City and at Nestucca. This is a good indication that the people of Tillamook County are in earnest in regard to harbor improvement, for if these two petitions receive majority votes at the election, as, no doubt, they will, the county will have four distinct Ports working for harbor improvements.

At a meeting of the Tillamook County Creamery Association last Thursday, it was decided to engage F. W. Christensen inspector for another year. It was anticipated, in view of the satisfactory showing of the inspector's work last year and the high price paid for cheese by the factories belonging to the association, that the Red Clover, Long Prairie and Ray's factories would come into the association, but they decided to stay out.

For the month of February 365 instruments were placed on file in the County Clerk's office, which is the largest number ever recorded in one month, and entailed considerable extra work in the office. The receipts from these instruments amounted to \$364.20. For the corresponding month last year the receipts from instruments amounted to \$136.00. The increase of business in the County Clerk's office is a good index to the life and activity that is now taking place in Tillamook County.

Articles of incorporation were filed at Salem in the office of the Secretary of State for the Carlton & Coast Railroad Company, capital stock \$500,000. The line is to leave Carlton and be extended to Tillamook Bay via Fairdale. The principle office will be in Carlton. The incorporators are W. D. Denniss, Fred Russell and S. B. Linthicum. The same incorporators also filed other articles for the incorporation of the Carlton Consolidated Lumber Company, with a capital stock of \$2,000,000, the principle office to be in Carlton.

The Port of Nehalem Directors have decided to get the Government Dredge and Snag Puller to do some work in this river. There are quite a number of floating snags to be removed that are now a source of much trouble to navigation during dark nights. Mr. Wheeler has agreed to bring the dredge around
