It was first decided to have the Elmore towed to Portland for repairs, but this was changed when the propeller was recovered, and she will remain here until the Osokosh returns with a new shaft, when the Elmore will be placed on the mud flats for repairs. The Elmore was towed to the city on Tuesday and discharged her cargo.
