

Editorial Snap Shots.

Attorney Holmes must take his hat off to Attorney Botts.

The supreme court handed Tillamook City a lemon last week. Well the city shouldn't have been so greedy in wanting all the road tax.

Pity the poor taxpayers. The officials having levied illegal road taxes within the corporate limits for a number of years, with no way for the taxpayers to recover them, it is now proposed to amend the charter so that the city can pile on more taxes—legally. Let the charter remain. If the city officials can't get along with the present taxation let them step out and allow others to run the city without so much taxation. It is noticed that those who are so anxious to serve the people in a public capacity directly they get into office, resort to all manner of dodges to increase the taxes. But, oh yes, the city charter must now be amended for the purpose of making people pay more taxes.

Now that the City vs. County road tax case has been decided in favor of the county, it is not out of place to re-publish some of the silly, absurd things which were published by the "powers behind the throne" in the Herald office to vilify Mr. Botts, the attorney for the county. Here is one paragraph for a starter:

Ex-Mayor Botts, who was attorney for the county and using every effort to prevent the recovery of the city's money held back by the county, and the attorney and one of the head of the ring that has had the city and county in a death grip for over 10 years.—Herald.

Since Mr. Botts has won out for the county he certainly can hand his traducers a lemon. Mr. Holmes, who was the attorney for the city, admitted that Mr. Botts made an able argument before the supreme court. But in view of the fact that Mr. Botts proved to the judges of the supreme court that the city was only entitled to 1½ mill road tax and then only when the city had levied it, and that the county had no right to levy and appropriate a road tax collected within the corporation, will the powers behind the Herald throne please explain to the people wherein Mr. Botts is "the head of the ring that has had the city and county in a death grip for over 10 years. It appears to us, as it will to most people, that it was the city and county officials who held the taxpayers "in a death grip for over 10 years," and it was Mr. Botts who straightened it out. This might have gone on for another 10 years, but the city becoming too hoggish, and wanting all of the illegally collected taxes, brought on a crisis, with the result that the property owners know now for certain that they have been illegally taxed and bled.

Discussing the toll road question and the move on L. L. Shortridge's part to again bottle up Tillamook County, the Telephone Register take the right and broad minded view of the situation after publishing our editorial remarks of a few weeks ago, and which brought forth a statement from County Judge Bird, who had turned down the proposition. The Telephone Register says:

"It will be plainly seen from the above clipping and letter what the progressive element of Tillamook County think about toll roads. If a vote could be had of the voters of Yamhill County it would also be seen in no uncertain tones that the people of Yamhill County are not in favor of having excuses for roads and paying for the privilege of going over them and this is precisely what will happen if Mr. Shortridge is given a lease on this road. It would be a shame and a disgrace to permit such a thing. We do not believe for one minute that the Yamhill County Court will permit it. It does not need to. Yamhill County is financially able to keep its portion of this road in a better state of repair than it will be kept in by an indifferent toll keeper, whose sole interest in the matter is to get all he can on as small an expenditure as possible. If there is a profit coming to anybody place it where it belongs, in the pockets of the taxpayers. Hundreds of our people go to Tillamook for their vacation every year. They are entitled to and should be permitted to travel over a free road.

Another thing, if a good free wagon road was constructed and kept in repair from here to Tillamook City and the neighboring beaches, hundreds of automobiles would make the trip from Portland to Tillamook. This as well as other towns en route receiving the benefit of this traffic.

Under no consideration should a toll road be permitted in any part of this fair land. As already intimated, toll roads belong to a past age, they are obsolete, a back-number, calculated to put a damper on progressive settlement and retard scientific and permanent road building. It would be the height of folly to grant a lease on this road and we believe our County Court has too much good sense to do so."

Wouldn't it have been another public outrage if L. L. Shortridge had succeeded in getting the Court to maintain another toll road for a period

of years? That kind of moss-backism kept the south part of Tillamook County back for a number of years because some of our county officials had the same moss back ideas of trying to keep people out of the county. Mr. Shortridge had better move to some back woods country if he wants to get into the toll road business again. Yamhill and Tillamook Counties are getting too progress, for it is for a Greater Yamhill and a Greater Tillamook that the press is contending for, not antiquated toll roads and the ideas of antiquated moss-backs.
