**Editorial Snap Shots.**

Bro. Turner is giving Bro. Baker a terrible amount of public notoriety. Thanks, Bro., it is so awfully kind of you. Others did the same thing long before Bro. Turner came to Tillamook, and no doubt others will do the same long after the Leaflet has disappeared and is forgotten.

The county road, north of Tillamook City, between Hoquartion and Doroughty sloughs, should be improved. It is only a small stretch of road, but the stumps and the logs should be removed and the road bed widened, for there is as much, if not more, travel over it than on any road in the county. It has often surprised us that the county court has allowed it to remain in this condition so long. Should an accident occur there the county would be liable to damages, and this would cost probably a dozen times as much as it would to fix the road. Anyway, it should be fixed with as little delay as possible.

A great many persons who have received their checks for the money illegally taxed by the former Port of Tillamook, were greatly surprised as to the smallness of the amounts they received, for in a number of cases where some of the taxpayers thought they had paid big amounts they found that it was only a few cents. Yet the most funny part of it is that some of the taxpayers, when they did get their checks, thought it was dollars instead of cents which were coming to them, and did not find out the mistake they had made until they went to cash them.

Tax paying time is about over. If the money is judiciously expended, as we hope it will be, no one should complain. This is a county that is rapidly coming to the front, and will make tremendous strides the next few years, and as it does so there will be greater demand for better roads and more substantial roads to stand up under the heavy travel that is sure to follow. The county court, with the addition of two rock crushers and two road rollers, have already prepared for this, and, with the advent of steel bridges to take the place of wood or combination bridges, the county court is gradually bringing about a changed condition of affairs in the county which will show good results before many years.

The Pacific Outlook, published at Grants Pass, says that Washington County is the banner dairy county in Oregon. Does the Outlook know that the little kingdom, known as Tillamook county, is connected with the state and by far the leading dairy county of Oregon? Tillamook county produced \$500,000 worth of cheese last year, and we have the figures and facts to prove it, and in another few years it will amount to \$1,000,000. So if Washington or any other county in Oregon is trying to wrestle the banner from Tillamook as the leading dairy county of Oregon, they will have to make tremendous strides to catch up or out distance this dairy county, where the meadows are all covered with a green verdure, with an abundance of feed for dairy herds, when the meadows in Washington and other counties of Oregon are dried up in summer and the fall of the year.

From present indications there will be a large number of visitors to Tillamook County, in fact, we expect to see an unusual influx into the county this summer. This being the case, an effort should be made to clean up and improve the city as much as possible, so as to give it a business like appearance. Amongst the visitors will be many who will be looking for new locations, investments and openings for new industries. Unfortunately for Tillamook City there is no commercial club to help boost the city or to entertain those who are looking for locations for new industries. A stranger of that description comes to this city wanting reliable information, but he is in a quandary directly he arrives here for there is no organization where he can go. Consequently the real estate agent circle around him like a swarm of bees, who pecker visitors with all manner of questions. There being no place where he can meet the business men, he drops into the pool rooms and then sizes up the town from those who hang around or spend their time in such places. What the city needs is more industries and a bigger pay roll, and before this can be obtained some united effort must be made to obtain them.

Probably the Headlight was a little hasty last week in what it said about revising the city charter so that the city could levy more than 1 1/2 mills for road purposes, and after reconsidering the matter from a civic pride point of view, we must admit that that amount of levy for road purposes is not sufficient to keep the streets in good condition for travel. We will also admit that the charter does need revising in some particulars, especially in regard to tipping houses, so that in the event of Tillamook County going "wet," all back and side rooms, cards and billiards, seats and chairs, also blinds and screens should be eliminated, which would abate to a great extent making tipping houses the resorts for the lazy, indolent class, and who are a nuisance to those who run those places. Another thing, the city limits should be extended beyond the railroad on the east so that the city could police that part. There are quite a number of changes which could be made in the city charter, and as Tillamook City has a bright future before it, with every indication that it will become one of the prettiest business centers in Oregon, the Headlight will not oppose a revision of the charter, provided that tax levies are kept within reason, for there is a possibility, whenever the authority is placed in the hand of a city, the highest possible levy is made. What we want to see avoided is making the taxes so high that it will drive away people who would start industries in this city, and this is a matter that the revisers should not lose sight of. What with the state, county, city, school district, water system and Port of Tillamook, taxes run up much higher in this city than they should.

**VOSBURG HAD CLOSE CALL.**
