The Tillamook Lumber Manufacturing Company closed a contract with the Potter-Chapin Realty Company for a large amount of lumber this morning, which is to be used at Bayocean Park, and it is expected that about two million feet of lumber will be used in improving that valuable property this year, as work on the new hotel is to be started and several hundred men employed this summer in its construction. Benson is a Winner.

Of all the public officials that Oregon has ever had the present governor, advanced to the office by peculiar circumstances, is probably nearest a commoner. Frank W. Benson loves his Oregon country next to his wife, and he has that kindly feeling for its every citizen which makes him a great man. He is possessed of marked qualities of statesmanship, although he abhors the plan of calling attention to himself at any time. Since his induction into office at Salem things have moved quite differently than before, because he believes with all of his heart and sole in republican principles and the republican party.

People in Baker City knew of Frank Benson and had a high regard for him before he spent two days in Baker last week, but after he had associated with Baker people they not only retained the high regard they had possessed for him, but they are now willing to go out and do a little work to see that he is retained in office.

Governor Benson's nature is best illustrated by his attitude on the governorship. It will be remembered that he was elected to the office of secretary of state and under Oregon law he succeeded to the governor's chair because of a vacancy.

He is making good in every way as a governor and many members of the party are demanding his election to the highest office of the State. But Benson says no, that he was elected by the people to be their secretary of state; that he is their governor by force of circumstances, and therefore has no right to ask election to that office, preferring to play fairly and run for a second term as secretary of state.

Few men, yes, we say from our knowledge of politics, that very few men would hesitate a moment when they saw it possible to fill the gubernatorial chair by election. But Benson has some conscientious scruples in the matter, just every public man who expects to stand on his feet in politics for any length of time, should have. And while there is a demand for him to run the republicans of Oregon cannot refrain from feeling a higher respect for Frank Benson because he views the matter as he does.

It matters not whether the direct primary or the assembly shall have majorities in Oregon primaries. It matters not whether there are one, two or five candidates against Benson or secretary of state, we believe that the people are for him and will renominate and reelect him. They could do no better.—Baker City Herald.
