At a meeting of the City Council Monday evening it was ordered that the city marshal notify George Elliott to remove the obstruction on 3rd Ave. west. A resolution was adopted to open 2nd Ave. west, Stillwell Ave. and 1st Ave. east to the slough.

Rev. Thos. Robinson will preach at Bay City on Sunday morning and in this city in the evening. Although Mr. Robinson's time will expire at the end of this month no action has been taken by the congregation to accept his resignation, which will be taken up at a meeting of the congregation after the service on Sunday evening.

The auction sale on Tuesday of 20 head of cows belonging to T. L. McFalls fell through. Only cows were bid on, and as these did not bring as high a figure as was expected the sale was called off. Mr.

McFalls had an offer of \$500 per head for the band, but as he sold one out of the band for that amount the party making the offer went back on that deal also.

The schedule in the south mail route will be changed on April 4, which will leave Tillamook City daily, except Saturday, at eight o'clock in the morning, the post office officials having extended the Grand Ronde to Tillamook route to Willamina. The mail will leave Willamina daily, except Sunday, on receipt of mail from 11:20 a.m. train. The time allowed is 24 hours and 35 seconds for the incoming mail and 28 hours and 15 minutes for the outgoing mail.

The Tillamook Lumber Manufacturing Company have purchased the logs belonging to the Miami Lumber Company now in the boom at the Wilson river. They will be brought to this city and manufactured. The mill company is getting together a large quantity of logs so as to keep the mill running. With the boom in this city filled with logs, Nigger slough full also, and with the Miami logs of over two million and over four million more logs contracted for with F. S. Whitehouse, Fred Burton, Fred Wheeler and the Mapes Bros., the mill is in good shape to handle a large amount of business this summer, when, probably, the mill company will make several shipments of spruce by steamer.

The amount of money collected by Sheriff Crenshaw for taxes up to the 15th amounted to \$192,576.36 being \$189,366.70 in full and \$3,189.

56 half payment. The roll called for \$223,180.50, leaving a balance of \$30,604.24 uncollected. Quite a number of large taxpayers failed to pay in time to get the 3 per cent rebate, but are doing so since the 15th. As they are now paying their taxes, another \$15,000 will be collected in this manner before the month closes. Those who have not paid their taxes by the first Monday in next month will become delinquent, while those who have paid half will be given to the first Monday in October to pay the balance. Sheriff Crenshaw and his deputy, John Aschm, have worked hard since the roll was turned over, which was two weeks later than last year, and a good deal of credit is due them for the prompt manner in which they handled the business and the large amount of money collected and turned over to the County Treasurer.

We regret to announce the death of Mrs. Neal, wife of Mr. H. C. Neal, which took place in this city on Friday afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. Neal came to Tillamook last October and opened a grocery store in the old post office building, Mr. Neal bringing his wife to this city, who was in poor health, thinking that a change of climate would be of benefit to her. The remains, accompanied by Mr. Neal and her two brothers, were taken out on the steamer Sue H. Emore on Sunday morning, to be buried at Eugene. Deceased was greatly respected and beloved by those who knew her. Deceased was born at Woodhull, N.Y., on August 25, 1860. Her maiden name was Ella V. Bartle, and she was married to

H. C. Neal in 1883. They went to Kansas in 1885, and came to Oregon in 1905. They resided in Lane County until they came to Tillamook last October. The deceased had but one child surviving, William, who is attending the North Western Medical College at Chicago. Her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. William Bartle, are living and reside at Eugene, Ore., also two brothers, P. J. Bartle, of Eugene, and Ira B. Bartle, of North Bend, both of whom came to Tillamook to see their sister previous to her death.
