Representative A. G. Beals' first term on the Board of Higher Curricula was concluded a few days ago. He was reappointed by Gov. E. W. Benson for a five years term. The position is an important one and indicates the high esteem in which Mr. Beals is held by the Governor of this state.

A game of base ball will be played on Sunday afternoon between the professional men and business men. For the professionals Dr. S. M. Kerron is manager and T. B. Handley is captain, and for the business men James Walton is captain and M. F. Leach is manager. The umpires are Dr. P. J. Sharp and Col. E. T. Haltom.

The daughter of Editor C. E. Trombly met with a bad accident in the Herald office on Tuesday. She placed her left hand on the cog wheel of the job press while it was in motion, and catching the fingers, gnashed the two middle fingers and the top of the index finger. They were so badly mashed that Dr. Boals had to amputate them.

The Executive Board of the Tillamook Commercial Club called a meeting of the members on Wednesday evening at the Court House and there was a large attendance. The object of the meeting was to submit a proposition to rent the hall in the Tillamook block, which was accepted, and the Board was authorized to go ahead and get the Club rooms fixed up and furnished as soon as possible.

The schooner Oshkosh came in on Monday and she came to this city the next day. Arrangements have been made with the Tillamook Lumber Manufacturing Company for the vessel to carry a large quantity of

apruce lumber to Linnton, and most of the logs recently bought from the Miami Lumber Company will be sawed up in this city to be shipped out on the Oshkosh, which will give that vessel a cargo of lumber on her outgoing trips for several months.

J. B. Caples has brought suit in the circuit court against O. C. Carson, the complaint against the defendant being "that in Tillamook County, Oregon, on or about the 24th day of March, 1910, the defendant did wrongfully and maliciously assault and beat the plaintiff upon and about the head, whereby the plaintiff was greatly injured and humiliated, and was thereby caused to suffer great physical and mental pain, anguish and distress, all to plaintiff's damage in the sum of \$1500.00."

Part of the Executive board of the Tillamook Commercial Club waited upon the County Court on Monday to oppose the petition of Mr. Vanciel to obtain money from the court for a write up of the county, and to impress upon the court that the club would be engaged in advertising work and any money allowed for that purpose should be done through the club organization, as it was a county affair. The court looked favorably upon the proposition and it is expected that the county court will help the club in that part of its proposed work.

At a meeting of the city council on Monday, Andy Nolan's resignation as city treasurer was read and accepted. The ordinance, so that moving pictures could be used in churches was thrown out. George Elliott appeared before the council in regard to opening the street to the slough, and as he would be damaged thereby the matter was referred to the committee on streets. Bills allowed were:
