

Editorial Soap Shots.

The city council did the correct thing when it turned down the ordinance to allow moving pictures to be exhibited in churches. There is more or less danger connected with moving picture exhibitions, and if the necessary precautions are not complied with to safeguard the public from accident, it would only be placing the lives of people in jeopardy.

We tender our apology to "Observer" in last week's Courier for stating that the cake of ice which was auctioned off was the first manufactured in the county. It should have read city, for ice was first manufactured in the county by Elmore's cannery, and since then by A. H. Malaney. But why was "Observer" afraid to attach his name to his letter? Is he ashamed of it?

One thing that confronts Tillamook City and County, and will become a serious problem before the Summer is here, is this: Where is the accommodation to be obtained for the visitors who come here this year? This county is not prepared for a great influx of people. More hotels and seaside accommodations will have to be erected. This city is in need of a first class hotel, and will have one, no doubt, before long.

The Executive Board of the newly formed Commercial Club find that it is no easy matter to assimilate all the opinions of those who have different ideas as to how the club should be run. The liquor question was a burning subject for a few days, as the Building Committee inserted a clause in its lease that no liquor was to be dispensed in the hall except at banquets. This did not meet with the approval of most of the Executive Board, for it looked as though the Building Committee undertook to dictate the policy of the club, instead of leaving it to the Executive Board, who is responsible for the proper conduct of the club. The matter was discussed pro and con, which resulted in the Executive Board agreeing to eliminate intoxicants, with the exception on special occasions.

Another survey of Tillamook bar and bay is ordered. Talk about government red tape, this is another instance. For over twenty years the government has been making periodical surveys of Tillamook bar and bay, and we will gamble that the re-survey will furnish no additional information other than that found in the previous surveys, other than that the sand may have changed a few inches. Tillamook people are sick and tired hearing about surveys and re-surveys of Tillamook bar and bay, and instead of so much red tape extending over so many years, if the government would change its tactics and make the necessary and long delayed improvement of the bar and bay it would, certainly be taking hold of a commendable improvement, for the prospective commerce of the port justifies the expenditure.

With all due respect to the members of the County Court, we want to say this in regard to advertising the county: As the Press of this county have been grinding away for years, doing yeomen service writing up and advertising the county, it seems to us that the editors should have been consulted and shown some consideration in the matter. The strap shot man, as one of the editors and boosters of this county, stands on his dignity in the Press being ignored. Personality we are not caring one iota, for this is the time of the year when advertising crafters and fakirs flock into the county and "touch" the business men, who are sorry to see, bite too readily. But this is not here nor there. The Press of this county is the most important factor, and will always remain so, in advertising and boosting Tillamook, and for that reason it is deserving of some recognition—by the County Court and the commercial bodies of this county.

County Business.

There was an adjourned meeting of the Board of County Commissioners last week, when County Judge H. F. Goodspeed and Commissioners G. W. Bodyfelt and H. V. Alley were present and transacted the following business:

In the matter of compensation for labor upon the public highways, it was ordered that the compensation for man be 25c. per hour and for man with team 50c. per hour.

In the matter of the approval of the town plot of Neah-Kah-Nie mountain, the same was approved and ordered placed on file.

In the matter of bids for clearing right of way on what is known as the Harter road, the Clerk was instructed to advertise for bids.

In the matter of appointing a County Veterinary upon the petition signed by some of the leading darymen and stock breeders, Dr. J. E. Reedy was appointed to the position, the appointment to take effect upon the approval of the State Board of Health.

In the matter of the petition of W. B. Powell to change the width of the Bewley Creek road, David Fitzpatrick, T. W. Lyster, and Otto Schrader were appointed a board of viewers.

In the matter of the appropriation of a publicity fund upon the recommendation of the Tillamook Commercial Club for a booklet to advertise the county, it was ordered that \$1000.00 be appropriated for that purpose, and that a committee consisting of Charles Ray, Frank A. Rowe and Webster Holmes be appointed and that the booklet be printed and distributed under the auspices of the Tillamook Commercial Club.

In the matter of bids for the construction of a trestle across Rocky Canon on the Necarney road, the clerk was ordered to call for bids.

The clerk was authorized to open ballot boxes for those precincts where special elections were to be held.

In the matter of advertising for bids for a bridge across the Wilson River at what is known as the Keifer place, the clerk was ordered to call for bids.

In the matter of the claim of D. E. Dawson for damages, the court allowed \$40.

In the matter of the approval of the plot of Neskowin, the same was accepted and ordered placed on file.

Condition of the Channel.

The Editor of the Tillamook Headlight wrote Congressman W. C. Hawley in regard to the shoaling of the channel and the need of a suction dredge at this port, and on Wednesday the following telegram was received.

Washington, D. C., April 13 1910. Hon. Fred C. Baker, Tillamook Ore.

The engineers at my request, upon presentation of your letter, advised me that they will investigate the matter and see if money from the emergency fund cannot be used to open the channel in the slough. W. C. HAWLEY.

Later in the day, Mr. James Walton received this telegram, from Senators Jonathan Bourne and George E. Chamberlain:

"Chief of Engineers has wired Mayor Morrow, of Portland, saying that if work in Tillamook channel is such as can be done under emergency appropriation a recommendation for allotment will be made. Suggest you communicate with Mayor Morrow."

The Port of Tillamook and the Tillamook Commercial Club wired these telegrams:

To Congressman Hawley: "Telegram to Baker received, submitted and considered by Port of Tillamook and Tillamook Commercial Club. Appreciate your efforts and will follow suggestions. Earnestly entreat that you make strenuous and powerful efforts to secure us physical examination by new engineer and a substantial appropriation based on local co-operation, which we are ready and willing to provide to the amount of \$100,000 or more. Cannot conceive that this port is to be left off with nothing while Siuslaw with far less commercial importance, gets appreciable consideration."

To Senators Bourne and Chamberlain: "Appreciate evidence of efforts on our behalf, expressed in telegram 13th, but what of future? Tillamook channel and harbor needs lasting and permanent improvements and trival sums now available provide merely temporary and superficial work. We want physical examination by new engineer and the same consideration that Siuslaw has received. Feel that you should at least secure us substantial appropriation conditioned on local co-operation which we will provide. As suggested, are communicating with Mayor Morrow."

To Major Jay J. Morrow: "At suggestion of Senators request that emergency appropriations be used for work in Tillamook channel, which Port of Tillamook has been forced to undertake. Advise what chance for physical examination of conditions and when."
