

G. E. Willman, Portland agent for the Du Pont Powder Co., held a stump blasting on Charley Svenson's place north of town on Monday. In the demonstration Mr. Willman used an electric blasting battery, placing several charges under advantageous points, thereby distributing the ground less as well as using less powder to do the work. The demonstration was witnessed by a number of interested farmers.

He blew out seven stumps, ranging in size from 15 feet to 3 feet, using only 150 pounds of powder.
