They were purchased from the Willowmore Farm, at Redmond, Wash. About four years ago Atkinson bought an Ayershire bull and are so well pleased with the results that it is their intention to build up an entire herd of these hardy, great milk producing cattle, about which so little is known in this county. The two calves recently brought into the county for breeding purposes. They are almost all white and attracted considerable attention, as they were taken from town, and no doubt will be a welcome addition to the already well graded herd.

W. J. Carver bought a thorough-breed two year old Holstein bull from B. S. Fryer, of Sumner, Wash., paying \$250 for the animal, and as there is a disposition amongst the dairymen to obtain the best breeds of Holsteins, Jersey, Guernseys, etc., it looks as if the dairymen will soon have some choice stock to dispose of. Oakhurst Milk and Butter King, which is the name of the bull bought by Mr. Carver, was sired by the Great Milk and Butter King, which sold for \$10,000. In a seven day test of the mother, Eona Beauty, was 20.50 pounds of butter, milk 453.90, average 3.61. His sire's dam now hold the world's butter record of 34.32 pounds in seven days with a test of 4.17. Mr. Carver's bull was bred by A. L. Brockway, of Auburn, N.Y.

Club Elects Officers.

Monday evening was the date on which the newly formed Tillamook Commercial Club was to hold its first annual meeting, when a large and representative gathering of business men and others met in the court house. The meeting was called to order by President Webster Holmes, who announced that \$1,000 had been obtained from the emergency fund to cut out the shoal places in the channel, and this was brought about by the efforts of the club and others. The first business was the election of officers. An effort was made to reappoint all of the officers but this being opposed, the club proceeded in the usual manner. President Webster Holmes, Secretary Erwin Harrison, and Treasurer James Walton, Jr., were all re-elected by unanimous consent. It was in the election of members of the Executive Board where a good deal of interest was shown. Some members were in favor of the old board and voted that way, but that did not prevail as the voting plainly indicated. Chas. I. Clough and Fred C. Baker having polled nearly all the votes cast were elected for two years on the board, and those for one year were E. T. Halton, Frank Severance and James Walton, Jr. The board remaining the same, with the exception that Messrs. Halton and Severance taking the place of Messrs. Rollie W. Watson and M. F. Leach. The Vice-Presidents elected were E. T. Halton, Tillamook; Chas Ray, Cloverdale; Frank A. Rowe, Nehalem; Russell Hawkins, Portland; T. B. Potter, Bay-ocean Park; and George Willett, Tillamook. During the evening Judge Galloway made a few remarks advising that they all pull together and pointed out the need of a commercial club and what good they were doing for the valley towns.

Circuit Court Adjourns.

Charles M. Lanning vs. Dwight Skinner. For deed. Continued.

C. G. Van Patten vs. Thomas J. Harris. Injunction. Continued.

Francis G. Bailey vs. Charles A. Bailey, Divorce. Default of defendant and divorce granted.

John Conklin vs. Mary Conklin Divorce. Divorce granted with custody of the children to go to the mother.

J. W. Sweeney vs. Solon Schiffmann. Injunction. Dismissed without cost.

Maud Joseph vs. David Joseph. Divorce. Continued.

A. J. Burdick vs. Alfred Gubser. Injunction. Dismissed.

George Tone vs. Tillamook City. Injunction. Demurrer to complaint overruled and plaintiff given until June 1st in which to reply.

J. W. Sweeney vs. Jos Effenberger. Writ of review. Cited to appear within ten days to show cause why writ has not been returned.

Hiram Eadus vs. Tillamook County Bank and Glenn H. Johnson. Action for money. Jury trial and verdict for plaintiff for \$75.00. Motion for new trial granted.

Andy Nolan vs. L. A. Le Miller, Agnes Fitzpatrick and Chester Stewart. Action for money. Motion to strike out and demur overruled. Jury trial and instructed verdict as to defendants, L. A. LeMiller and Agnes L. Fitzpatrick, but unable to agree as to Chester Stewart.

George N. Hodgdon vs. H. F. Goodspeed, as Judge of Tillamook County. Writ of review. Motion to quash dismissed and writ sustained.

J. B. Caples vs. O. C. Carson. Damages. This was a jury case and caused a good deal of local interest. The cause of the suit was that Carson had given Caples a good licking in a personal encounter, and getting the worse of it, brought suit for \$10,000. The defendant showed that Caples was the aggressor and the jury brought in a verdict for the defendant.

Lois MacMahon vs. Robert S. Hull. Damages. Demurrer sustained and defendant given time to amend.

Sarah E. Bunn vs. George Vanderveer. Damages. Settled by stipulation.

Tillamook City vs. J. C. Holden as the county clerk. Judgment for costs.

Mitchell, Lewis & Staver Co. vs. E. E. Tyler. To cancel deed. Default entered. Decree as prayed for in complaint.

P. R. & N. Co. vs. Harriet Vaughn. Condemnation. Permission granted to amend complaint by interlineation. Judgment on stipulation.

W. H. Wilson vs. D. A. Bailey. For deed. Taken under advisement.

P. R. & N. Co. vs. Mary Lee. Condemnation. Continued.

Samuel C. Tomlinson vs. Chas. J. Nelson et al. Foreclosure. Dismissed.

H. M. Todd vs. P. R. & N. Co. Damages. Motion to make specific withdrawn. Judgment entered.

Nancy E. Olsen vs. Norman Olsen. Defendant cited to show cause. Defendant ordered to pay \$30 per month into court for support of the family; also \$25 as expenses for the suit.
