Probably the reason that no bids have been made is because it is generally understood that the route will be discontinued after the 1st July, when the railroad will pack the mail between this city and Vossburg.

The next district convention will be held at Cloverdale.

At a meeting of the Executive Board of the Tillamook Commercial Club on Monday evening, the matter of the city census was taken up and discussed. As it was thought that the club could be of some assistance in helping Mrs. Wade get a full count, Messrs. C. L. Clough, F. C. Baker and Frank Severance were appointed a committee with full power to act. The committee feel satisfied that Mrs. Wade has made a careful canvass of the city, but should anyone be missed in the enumeration, the committee would be glad to be informed immediately. In behalf of the Civil Improvement Committee of the Tillamook Commercial Club, the editor took up the matter of the improvement of the county road north of town with County Judge Goodspeed. There is as much, if not more, travel over this road as any road in the county, and having been left for a number of years in a bad condition, it is an eye sore to those coming into the city from the north or going out that way, as well as being dangerous to travel over at night. The Judge admitted that it was a disgrace to leave the road that way and promised to have it improved and as soon as possible. Thanks, Judge, on behalf of the Commercial Club.

**City Council Meeting.**

A meeting of the city council was held on Monday evening, with Mayor Coates and Councilmen Wilt, Brodhead, Laughlin and Harrison present. The bills allowed were: F. G. Ford, \$66.50; T. B. Handley, \$45; Webster Holmes, \$5; Harvey Parker, \$8.75; Otto Schrader, \$30; U. G. Jackson, \$20; Henry McKinley, \$10; King & Smith, \$30.96; J. B. Langley, \$6.58; W. T. Kimball, \$13.25; Tillamook Lumber Mfg. Co., \$13.02; Vic Stewart, \$2.00; George Willett, \$5. The surveyor's report of Stillwell's Ave., First Ave. E. and First Ave. W. was adopted. Carl Shortridge was appointed city treasurer. The office of street commissioner was declared vacant, also the office of councilman for the first ward. Attorney Nolan appeared for George Elliott, demanding payment for his interest on Third Ave. W., and if not paid threatened to sue the city. The city council decided that it did not owe Elliott anything.

**Mill Company Wins Case.**

The law suit over the insurance money in connection with the burning of the Tillamook Lumber Company's saw mill in this city in October, 1907, in which the London and Liverpool and Globe Insurance Co. refused to pay the \$5000 insurance, has been decided in favor of the mill company. The suit was first brought in the circuit court in this county and then taken to the United States court and tried before Judge Wolverton, who decided in favor of the mill company. The point that the insurance company raised was that the saw mill, which burned on a Sunday, was idle and inoperative and should have had a watchman. The mill company contended that the saw mill was not idle and inoperative, but was only closed down on account of it being Sunday. The insurance company appealed the case, and Monday a telegram was received from San Francisco stating that the Court of Appeals had sustained the decision of the lower court. Attorney Botts ably defended the case for the mill company, and as the insurance company had an array of leading attorneys to defend it, much credit is due Mr. Botts for winning the case for the mill company.
