We understand that the liquor element have about decided upon the person they intend to run for sheriff. All we can say at the present time is: A poor tool and a poor specimen of humanity.

The merchants of Pendleton have agreed to do no other advertising except in the local newspapers. That is rough on advertising schemes and advertising fakirs, but a wise move on the part of the merchants.

man is paying clerks to hang around those places. Neither should the city. The city council is beginning to take notice and take action, which will meet with general approval.

A person made the suggestion to us last week that we ought to run a daily newspaper. As the gentleman came from a county with four times the population of Tillamook, which hasn't a daily and only weekly newspapers, the snap shot man began scratching the bald place on the top of his cranium and suggested to the visitor that it would be a good idea for him to give to the editors in his home county, for it is population that is wanted before daily or semi-weekly papers can be made a financial success of.

Cut it out! All personal, street or factional fights and all pull and work together for the betterment and up building of the city. If there is to be any scrapping in the future let it be with those who vie with each other as to who can do the most to improve the city and the county. There is sure to be a few who will stand back, criticize, knock and who never put their hands in their jeans and willingly give a few dollars to bring about public or other improvements. Cultivate the idea that Tillamook is the garden spot of Oregon—and it is.

Let the City Council pass an ordinance prohibiting any more plank sidewalks, and insist upon cement. The Headlight still contends that the Port of Tillamook should get busy and decide upon widening the water front and adopt some plan for the permanent improvement of the slough. The Port was elected for that purpose. There is nothing to be gained by dilly-dallying and procrastination, only the holding back of improvements that are of vital importance to this city and which should now be vigorously pushed forward to completion. The first Port of Tillamook did nothing and was made a hobby-horse of, and for fear that the present Port may get a similar reputation, we would suggest that the Port get busy right away with the idea of accomplishing something.

A large quantity of lumber, for Bayocean Park, is being manufactured by the Tillamook Lumber

Manufacturing Company, and every few days a large raft or saw of lumber is towed from this city to be used in the improvement of Bayocean Park. A large amount of money is being expended in the improvement of Bayocean Park, and with the large amount of improvements that are to be made this summer, this beach and bay resort is destined to become a most popular place for summer visitors to Tillamook county. Unlike other summer resorts which have been placed on the market, Bayocean Park has not only outdistanced all others in improvements, but is now carrying on these improvements with more zeal and activity. If others who have beach property for sale were doing the same amount of improvements as Bayocean Park it would put a great stimulus into beach property, for there are splendid locations all along the Tillamook coast for summer resort, in fact, there are none better. For years, the beaches have been inaccessible for lack of railroad facilities into Tillamook county, but with that difficulty soon to be overcome with the completion of the P. R. & N. Co.'s railroad and the building of electric lines, Tillamook County is destined to become the most popular summer resort in Oregon. It is to be hoped that these few remarks will incite others to improve their beach property. One essential is hotel accommodation. It is safe to say that large hotels on Garibaldi and other beaches are greatly needed, and some activity in that direction would help boost beach property wonderfully.
